ALMOST A CATASTROPHE.

Five Men Narrowly Escape Drowning in the Willamette at the Bridge Site.

A narrow escape from a wholesale drowning occurred at the bridge site yesterday. At noon, six men, including A. S. Miller, who has been superintending the bridge work during the absence of his son, F. J. Miller, H. A. Love, Mr. Stowe, and two other men, started across the river in a small boat and when about 100 feet from the bank in county shore the boat was carried down by the current against a pile which had been driven into the water as a fastener for a guy rope, and was capsized, precipitating all of the men into the swiftly flowing current.

Mr. Love, Mr. Stowe and another man caught hold of the pile. The two latter succeeded in climbing up to the top in safety, but Mr. Love being underneath the others could not hold on and was almost drowned by a man who went to his assistance in a boat. Mr. Miller was also in a precarious situation and was being carried down by the current when one of the men reached him and outstretched his hands until the shore was reached. The other occupants of the boat swam safely to shore. The men on the pile were then rescued from their perilous perch.

Mr. Miller and Mr. Love were in an exhausted condition. They were assisted across to this city, and every attention given them. Mr. Miller, who is an aged gentleman, is confined to his room as a result of the accident, but nothing serious will follow, it is hoped.

Mr. Love has fully recovered. Mr. Miller, of Grant's Pass, and his son F. J. Miller, is clerk of the state railroad commission.

Wreck at the Columbia's Mouth. The British ship Straithblane, sixteen days from Honolulu, in ballast, went ashore twenty five miles north of Astoria at 5 o'clock yesterday morning. She was tottering on the beach at the water's edge, and the masts and rigging gone, and the hull fast going to pieces. In an hour the Cape Hancock life-saving crew and a large number of men from Lewis reached the scene of the wreck on a special train. It was low water when the vessel struck, and a heavy gale blowing. The life crew worked bravely and the men went up to their necks in the waves. One of the men, James Nelson, an I. I. report twenty-three more on board. The waves were sweeping clear of the vessel. All were got safely ashore except six, who were drowned. Captain Cathlin, Richard Hughes, carpenter, Thomas Hunter, cook, Paul McLeod, seaman, a passenger, a lawyer from Honolulu, Wm. Lewis, and another man. Four bodies were recovered.

NEWS OF THE COAST.

Interesting Items from Exchange Throughout the Northwest.

Superstitious people of Pupallup are now greatly alarmed because there are thirteen teachers employed in the public schools.

Some rascal set fire to 3000 cords of wood, belonging to the railroad company, near Sisson, Cal., one night lately, and it proved a total loss.

Several important suits have been brought in Yamhill county to ascertain the exact legal rights of several local irrigation companies, and to test the constitutionality of the irrigation law passed last winter.

J. M. Body, the immigration agent, who says he has a colony of 1500 persons whom he will locate in Oregon, is traveling through the Willamette valley on business connected with his enterprise. They intend to engage in manufacturing enterprises.

Great preparations are being made for an extensive acreage in grain this coming year in Eastern Oregon. New settlers are constantly arriving, and the amount of ground that is being broken up indicates the confidence farmers have in this part of the state.

The farmers of Eureka Flat, near Walla Walla, are striving to raise means to sink an artesian well. The Union-Journal says it is proposed to sink a well to be benefited shall pay 10 cents an acre into a fund to be used for this purpose, and this assessment on the 100,000 acres owned on the flat would raise a sum large enough to sink a drill from 1500 to 2000 feet deep. The farmers will probably approve this plan, as the cost for each individual will be small and the benefits to be derived will be large.

One of the best bird dogs in Lane county is owned by Park Zumwalt, of Irving precinct. An old and experienced cock Chinese pheasant will not be set by a dog, but will keep running at almost the speed of a horse. Mr. Zumwalt's dog has evidently studied the nature of the bird and found a way to bring him to a stand. After a hot chase of a couple of hundred yards he leaves the scent and makes a wide circle around the bird, two or three times. Not being pursued the bird stops, and the dog comes back to the scent, follows and easily sets Mr. Chinaman.

Passed a Bogus Check. One Charles Stone, was arrested yesterday on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses in passing a bogus check on the Bank of Oregon. It was for \$27.00 and was signed by John Gahan, and Stone said he had been working in a logging camp on the Santiam, and had come to town to look to get it cashed. He presented it at the Exchange Hotel and Mr. James Murray paid him \$3 on the check, but suspecting that it was not all right, investigated the matter and found the check to be bogus. Stone is in jail to await examination.
