MIXED THE FUNDS.

They have placed G. W. Olney temporarily in charge of the office.

Will Be Settled by Abstraction.
WASHINGTON, Nov. 10.—The hearing in the Behring sealers case in the supreme court was resumed this morning. Solicitor-General Tait continuing his argument. Attorney-General Miller interrupted Tait during the course of his remarks to announce that it had been agreed to submit the controversy between the United States and England as to the seal fisheries to arbitration, and that an official announcement of that fact would soon be made.
