STATE AND COAST.

Dr. Cusick Elected President of the Capital National Bank.

NEW STATE FAIR RULES.

An Astonishing Increase in the Number of Issues in Oregon Notes From the Capital.

SALEM, Nov. 17.—The assessment roll of Curry county shows a total taxable value of \$508,107. There are 143 polls. As equalized by the board it is \$551,755. Jackson county's total taxable value is \$3,896,701; as equalized by the board it is \$3,804,641. The number of polls is 1024.

At Gervais yesterday wheat went to 92 cents, but fell again today to 89 cents. At Salem 96 cents is quoted. Hops, 15 cents.

The directors of the Capital National Bank met to-day and elected Dr. W. A. Cusick, of E. S. Wallace, deceased, as president.

The State Board of Agriculture met to-day in annual session. During the afternoon the revision of the entire code of rules and regulations governing the fair competition. The number of entries, constituting the competition from three to two. Any number by one owner is not to be confined to mean competition. The number of entries and improvements to grounds, was left with the executive committee.

The state insane asylum to-day contains 722 patients, being an increase of ninety-six since the first of the year. The case during the preceding two years has been 102. There are now less than a dozen empty beds in the whole institution and more room must be provided. Of those admitted for treatment, fifteen are under the age of 15, and sixty seven are over the age of 55. The largest number are between the ages of 30 and 40. Marion county sends more patients than any other except Multnomah, Clatsop and Clackamas.

Portland, Nov. 17.—The assessment roll of the city of Portland has been completed. The figures make the total for the entire consolidated city of something very near to \$6,000,000 gross, or a net value of \$4,500,000. The value for a year for the same property was \$20,800,540, so the increase this year is \$15,181,885, equivalent to 60 per cent.

BURNED TO DEATH.

Several People Perish in a Fire in New York.

AN ENTIRE FAMILY MISSING.

Freezing Selves and Incidents—Which? Business Blocks Burned in St. Louis at a Loss of \$200,000.

New York, Nov. 17.—Half a dozen or more lives were lost early this morning by a fire in a row of frame buildings in Brooklyn. The flames were discovered at 2:20 o'clock on the third floor of the three-story frame building, No. 129 West 4th street. The building was occupied chiefly by families of mechanics. The flames spread with great rapidity, and in half an hour four or five buildings were blazing at once. Harry and Edward were rescued by firemen from the top floor of No. 129, both badly burned. A butcher named Schnabel, who lived on the second floor of No. 129, rushed into the street with a child in his arms. He said his wife, one of his children, his mother-in-law, Mrs. Schaefer, and her two children, Minnie and Willie, 15 and 17 years old respectively, were unable to escape and were burning to death. He ran up and down the street in an excited way, calling on the firemen to save them. The wildest excitement existed among the people in the neighborhood and the streets were filled with half-dressed, crying women and frantic men.

At 3 o'clock the whole row consisting of twenty frame houses, was in flames, and every available engine in Brooklyn was fighting the fire, and it was hours before the flames were completely under control. It is impossible to tell how many lives are lost, but one entire family is missing, and no trace can be found of five members of the Schnabel family.

A BLIZZARD RAGING.

ITS COLD BLAST SWEEPS OVER WISCONSIN.

A Cold Wave Advancing Toward The Northwest—Freezing in The East.

ASHLAND, Wis., Nov. 17.—A heavy blizzard raged in northern Wisconsin last night, the wind blowing a gale and the snow drifting. Apprehensions is felt for some of the vessels which cleared yesterday morning, with one or two lumber. If the storm continues at the present rate, the railroads will be blocked. The weather is getting colder.

WASHTON, Nov. 17.—The low pressure yesterday morning extending from Lake Huron to Texas with the principal center over Michigan, has developed, and is now a decided cyclonic area centered in the Upper St. Lawrence valley. As the cold wave advances rain will turn to snow followed by generally clearing weather, with frost in the Gulf and south Atlantic states, and freezing weather from the Carolinas northward.

A GREAT WRECK.

The Blake is Likely to Come to America Some Day.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—In naval circles there is a considerable flutter over the proposed trial of the new cruiser Blake next year. She should make twenty-two knots with a forced draught of 2,000 horse-power, and twenty knots at a natural draught of 13,000 horse-power, but will probably not be driven at more than the latter and accepted at these figures. The chances are not remote that the Blake, which is probably the most remarkable cruiser in the world, may be sent to America as flagship instead of the Hercules.

THE PEACE OF EUROPE.

It Does Not Seem to be in Danger of Disturbance.

VIENNA, Nov. 17.—In the Hungarian delegation to-day Count Kalnoky, Austrian minister of foreign affairs, scouted the idea that the visit of the French fleet to Cronstadt had any bearing on the discussion of the Bardschilles question. Adverting to the relations between Austria and Italy, Kalnoky said that the two governments had an identical conservative eastern policy. He stated from personal knowledge that the interview between De Gess, French minister of foreign affairs, and Rudini, the Italian premier, would have no disturbing influence. On the contrary, the European outlook is quite peaceful, otherwise he would have been obliged to ask for larger credits for the purpose of armament. Regarding the movement of Russian troops on the Austrian frontier, Count Kalnoky said that so far as he knew they still continued.
