DISPOSAL OF RICHES.

The use and the abuses of wealth forms one of the weightiest propositions for human consideration. The Macon Telegraph says that Mr. Carnegie, who is a very rich man, has expressed views as to the duty of rich men in the use of their wealth that must be described as radical.

We fear the forces of socialism and we dread the power of anarchy; but socialism does not spring from stones and anarchy does not grow by the ravines of denagogues. They both come from real conditions are the ones which men of wealth have to meet.

There are few rich men, if we adopt the standard set up by Mr. Hewitt and apparently accepted by Mr. Depew—so far that the latter must have felt he was sermonizing a very small audience. But what he said is true, and applies to the possessor of millions far less numerous than twenty.

EAST INDIAN officers are expressing the opinion that the uprising of the tribesmen on the Pamir frontier is ominous news, and seem to think that the difficulties are fomented by Russian intrigue. This view of the troubles might be accepted as the correct one if it were not the fashion of many officers to hold

the Russ responsible for everything that goes wrong in India. Still the uprisings, taken in connection with recent movements of the Russians in the Pamir country may have a deep significance, and may be the prelude to a war for supremacy in the orient which may ultimately involve all the European countries if there is any meaning in alliances.

GENERAL sympathy will be expressed all over the Willamette Valley for the old pioneer, Medorum Crawford, whose life is fast ebbing away, with the intense suffering from a cancer in the throat. He is 73 years old and is identified with the early history of Oregon.

It seems that Mr. Gladstone can discern some of the effects of free trade in England, even if he refuses to locate the cause, for in a late speech he declares that every effort should be used to prevent the migration of laborers from that country to this, and says they are needed at home.

The way people are packed together in cities like New York, is illustrated by the announcement that two hundred and fifty people are homeless from the destruction of a single tenement in that city.
