The Chronicle says that "It is stated that in the recent Ohio elections mistakes were found in 31,000 ballots. At a recent election in Sacramento city the percentage of errors was nearly as great. In one ward, out of a total of 397 ballots, 161 illegal ballots were cast, 61 of which were thrown out. The Australian system may be a beautiful one, but its strong point is not simplicity. Certain it is that the more simple any legal machinery is—a law that applies there as well to mechanical appliances—to the work well, the more effective and satisfactory it is.

The prospects of an European war are not yet assured either for or against. The situation seems to be an unnatural quiet on the part of the leading nations while they are impetuously rushing forward preparations for the conflict in the shape of armament of all kinds. The New York, Henry Claws letter for this week, in summing up the financial situation says that "in Europe, there is a singular calm, succeeding the late financial apprehensions and the fears of impending war. Exactly what estimate is to be put upon this new aspect, it is not easy to say. It would doubtless be utopian to assume that there has been no occasion for all the recent excitement, and not safe to conclude that all the dangers have been permanently averted. There can be no doubt that financiers and diplomats have united to put the best possible face upon a perilous situation, to plaster over the weak spots in finance and politics and to conceal the pit-falls; and they have thus succeeded in recovering the reins into their hands and arresting the headlong rush towards we know not what catastrophe. Quite possibly, all courts have been so alarmed at the near possibility of being rushed into a great war without the necessary co-operation from the banking power, that they are anxious to postpone the inevitable until the sieves of war have become more available; but there is nothing in any quarter to indicate that the fundamental causes of quarrel have been even abated, much less removed; and we can hardly hope that European financiers will maintain any other than a highly restrained attitude. London evidently thinks that England will be able to keep herself aloof from continental troubles, and we therefore find on that market a comparatively hopeful feeling and a continued disposition to take part in an active speculative movement at New York, which is there awaited with sanguine expectancy.
