NEWS OF THE COAST.

Interesting Items From Exchanges Throughout the Northwest.

Alexander Finlayson, better known as "Sandy" was dragged to death near Prineville on the 14th, inst, by being thrown from his wagon while hauling supplies to his ranch on Crooked river.

A woman named Mrs. Solberg, a "grass widow" the mother of four children left Elgin last week with a Chinese paramour. She and her Mongolian were driven out of Enterprise, Wallowa county, a few days previously.

A large log jumped from the chute at Lowell and struck the barroom of a hotel, completely demolishing the fixtures and badly frightening some men who were in the other end of the room.

The Congregational church societies of the East during the past year have paid in to Kalamazoo \$1200 cash—\$800, from missionary fund on minister's salary, and \$400 donation, from building fund, on church building.

Barker & Smith, of Tillamook, have sold their sawmill property for \$11,045. The local proprietors will add a sash and door factory.

A saloon at Hood river was broken into a few nights ago and eighteen gallons of whiskey, 350 cigars and forty-five pounds of beef extracted.

A fresh in the river at Bay City carried away C. W. Allen's logs and let about 40,000 feet of boom get away. He was picked up quite a number of them however.

The damage done by the storm at Tillamook is being repaired. The front has been replaced on the skating rink, the Catholic church has been placed back on its foundation, a subscription is being circulated to raise funds to rebuild the Christian church.

When Does the Century End?

The statistical editor of the Oregonian must have been drinking, at any rate he is all at sea in his figuring. He says: "The end of the nineteenth century is approaching, but different people have different ideas as to when it will come. Most people will say without stopping to think that the nineteenth century ends on the 31st of December, 1899, but others claim that it does not end till the 31st of December, 2000. The local department of the Oregonian decides that the nineteenth century ends on December 31, 1891, to the century, instead of eight years, as many suppose. The telegraph department of the Oregonian disagrees in regard to this and has the local people at a disadvantage. The matter will have to be settled by the editorial force." The above paragraph from the Oregonian reads as if the writer believed he could put a thousand years in a century. The nineteenth century will end at midnight, on the 31st, 1900, which will be nine years from the end of 1891. Nineteen hundred years cannot elapse until the end of the year 1900, and the twentieth century will begin with the beginning of the year 1901.

The Ferry Trouble.

The breaking of the ferry cable, whereby travel across the river at this place has been suspended for a few days, has been very annoying. The new cable ordered arrived yesterday and was put in place. The cause of the break is said to have been damage to the cable caused by the steamer Modoc having run into it. The steamer's smokestack was also damaged and her owners have put in a bill for \$124 damages. The ferry company retained by putting in a new cable will for damages to the cable by the steamer, claiming that the steamer was out of the channel or she would not have run afoul of the cable. The ferry boat resumed its regular trips last night, and with the new cable is in better condition than ever.

Alleged Cruelty to Animals.

Wm. Shields was arrested yesterday on a warrant out in Justice Humphrey's court, charging with cruelty to animals, in neglecting to properly care for certain stock owned by the family. The examination will be held to-day.

The Destruction of Forests.

The farmers of Marion county in the Salem Grange have adopted the following resolutions calculated to meet the demand of the times: Whereas, It is a fact well known to men of science and to many of common observation that to denude mountain ranges of their forest covering is a certain mode of lessening the summer flow of water in streams having their sources in such mountain ranges, and

Whereas, The question of continued summer flow of the streams of the Pacific slope is one of vast moment, in view of the uses of such flow for purposes of irrigation and as manufacturing forces that preservation becomes to the present a pressing duty to the near future, and

Whereas, We believe ripe dry grasses upon the mountain ranges are amongst the most certain means of forest destruction on our interior mountain range, from the preservation of the water flow to the arid plains is of the utmost moment, therefore,

Resolved, 1st—That all public land of the United States over 4,000 feet above the sea level ought to be withdrawn from sale or settlement.

Resolved, 2d—That as a measure of safety to the forest growth on such mountain lands and in the interest of our animal industries these mountains should be let to stock men for grazing purposes under the supervision of the forestry bureau of the department of agriculture.

Reform School inmates.

The Sunday Oregonian indicates the reform school will soon have plenty of students. It says that George Dayton, aged 14 years, and William Robert Kern, aged 15, were brought before Judge Stearns yesterday on the charge of putting in the hands of the boys admitted to the state reform school at Salem. The parents were examined, and made statements in relation to the charges. After hearing the parental evidence, the court made an order admitting the boys to the reform school. The charges made by the fathers of the children are that they are incorrigible and can not be restrained by proper authority, being disobedient and having acquired indecent and immoral habits; that the parents are incapable of exercising proper discipline or care, etc. Both boys were taken to Salem last evening to be given into the care of Superintendent Miles.

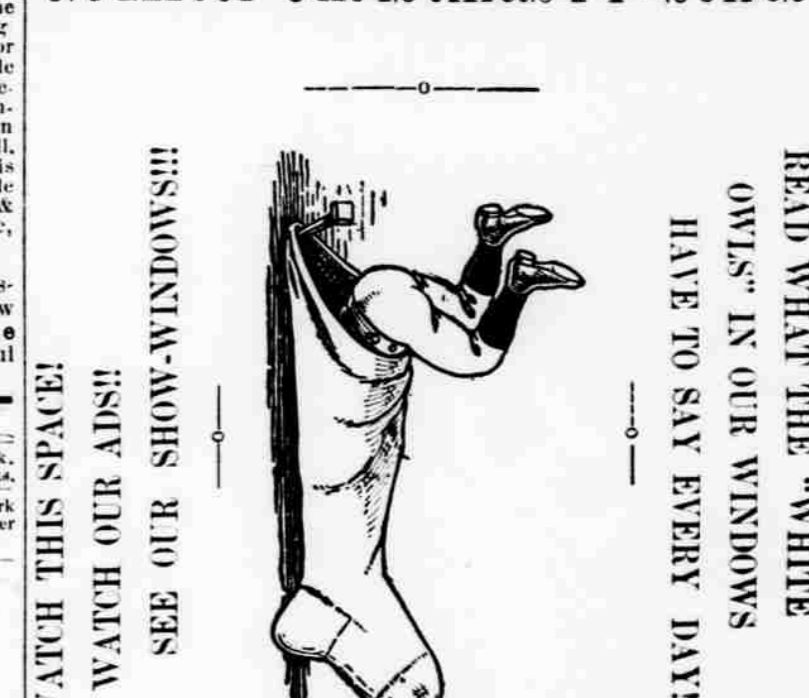
