NEATLY ROBBED OF \$100.

Wells, Fargo & Co.'s Agent at the Summit Tea Affrontate With Mrs. Post.

Corvallis Times: For some time past Mr. J. S. Brown, a young man of good character and standing, has acted in the capacity of telegraph operator for the O. P. & W. Wells Fargo, Co.'s agent at Summit, in this county.

Mr. Brown, in his double capacity of representing the O. P. and Wells Fargo, has at times been in the possession of large sums of money, but notwithstanding this fact, neither the O. P., R. R. or the express company has furnished a safe to their agent.

The agent was therefore compelled to carry the money on his person. On the night of Dec. 23d Mr. Brown and Mrs. Katie Post were seated on a lounge at her residence, a short distance from the Summit station.

Mr. Brown claims that he had 20 U. S. notes of the denomination of \$20 each when Mrs. Katie took her position on the lounge by his side. It is certain that Mr. Brown took it for granted that Mrs. Katie was actuated by love and affection toward him and in a modest way submitted to her embraces, and perchance went through the trying ordeal with much misgivings.

It is expressed out at the Summit as a "gentle laying on of hands." Mr. Brown, in some mysterious way, was done up brown, for he placed his vest under his pillow, he discovered his pocket book had been "obscured" and the \$400 was not left. He left Mrs. Katie on a lounge, and she was fired, but immediately on discovering his large pocket book taken from his inside vest pocket returned to that "laid" room only to hear Mrs. Katie elink the door of a room connected therewith and his face.

Mr. Brown is positive he had the \$400 when Katie took her place at his side—that there was no other person in the room except himself and Mrs. Katie for about one-half hour before going to his room—that he immediately returned on the discovery of the lost treasure supposing that Katie took it from him only as a joke. Katie Post has the reputation of being a joker at the Summit. Katie had retired to her room and notwithstanding Mr. Brown demanded in loud tones his lost coin, no Katie responded. U. S. to James Sanderson, 46.65 acres, section 4, township 11 south, range 2 west; patent. To improve the Willamette. Representative Herrmann has embraced in one bill the several amounts for the improvement of the Willamette river above Portland and beyond Corvallis to Eugene City.

This bill calls for special work at Ross island and Clackamas rapids under separate projects. The former is to be improved by returning dams and dredging and the latter by a mud dam and other construction, for each of which projects separate estimates are submitted, and approved for the improvement to rectify the course of the river above Corvallis. The bill also provides \$60,000 for miscellaneous work on the upper river above Oregon City, such as at Independence, Salem and Eugene City.
