CITY ORDINANCES.

Ordinance No. 3.

THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF FOREST GROVE DO ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Sec. 1. That from and after the passage of this Ordinance, no shows, circuses, theatricals or other amusements shall be permitted to exhibit within the corporate limits of this town without first having obtained a license for that purpose; and the Recorder is hereby authorized to issue licenses as herein provided.

Sec. 2. Any person wishing to obtain a license shall apply to the Marshal and it shall be his duty to enquire into the character of the exhibition proposed to be given, and to charge such a sum as may appear to him to be just and proper. That no license shall be granted for less than five dollars for each exhibition given. Nor shall the Recorder issue such license until the applicant shall file with him the Marshal's receipt for the amount charged specifying the number of exhibitions paid for.

Sec. 3. Any person or persons who shall violate the provisions of Sec. 1 of this Ordinance, shall on conviction thereof before the Recorder's Court in a suit in the name of the people of the Town of Forest Grove, be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars and shall be imprisoned until said fine is paid, said imprisonment in no case to exceed thirty days.

Sec. 4. It shall be the duty of the Marshal to prosecute the suit contemplated by this Ordinance, and to pay all moneys collected in accordance with its provisions, into the Treasury in the same manner as other taxes.

Sec. 5. Nothing in this Ordinance shall be so construed as to require a license from the people of the Town for any concert, lecture, fair, festive or school exhibition they may wish to give.
