PROF. CONDON'S LECTURE.

The Professor remarked that a previous lecture upon the mountains, their structure &c. was but a necessary provision for the full understanding of the outline of Oregon. As the lecture alluded to treated mainly of the surface, to-day the lecture will be upon

OUR MOUNTAINS.
Their form, structure, contents. First, their forms are results of long wear by frosts, volcanic eruptions, earthquakes, &c. Frosts and rains, by continuous and steady action make changes on the mountains. Frost being so powerful is often made use of to lessen man's labor in cleaving stone, and it does its work in a short time and better than it could be done by artificial means.

Some rocks are porphyry and felspar are worn away by absorption alone, and the soft or rocks being the result of first, igneous or recent. The surface of mountains, take their shape from winds, rains, frosts, water &c., and they may be tilted up, as we see sometimes, but commonly are swelled belts. It is evident by reference to maps of North America, Africa, and especially South America, that mountains in their lines of upheaval correspond remarkably to the coast line of these continents. I have explained the reason heretofore. Second, their contents. 21 layers are great bands of stratified rocks, 21 layers are eruptive (not volcanic always) rocks which overflow and are injected into the first layer. These rocks are in fissures in a molten state and when forced out, overflow the under layer as water does ice when broken. The earliest rock-granite having in color and is composed of quartz, a light color, felspar ditto, and softer, and felspar mica. Granite is distributed into fissures and over surfaces of older rock. In granite the glaucous dikes of mica always reveal the kind of rock. Use a knife on the other substances and you find that felspar can be scratched but quartz cannot. In older granite contains granite and the same part as basalt does on our present mountains. In deep ravines granite has been found in the Paleozoic strata. Porphyry is next in age and was named from a word meaning purple. It is volcanic mud with flakes of felspar scattered through it, as raisins are in puddings. It is not found until the granite period closed. The 3d rock is rough like pumice is called Trachite from trachos, rough. There is an interesting exhibition of it in the De Chutes river bed. 4th Basaltic rocks are quite common but Mt. Hood has more porphyries on its surface and in that is unlike Mount Adams and Jefferson on their surface. Basalt is hard, sometimes called ironstone—and the pores in it were made by gas escaping when the rock was in a molten state. To recapitulate. The granite is first forming model of mountains. It is found on Puget Sound ground down from the mass of mountains. Porphyries are next and abundant on the Columbia. Trachyte is third in order and may be seen in the John Day valley. Lastly and crowning all is basalt and it is often curiously thrown in columns as at Oregon City and elsewhere. The means by which it is done is, columns are at right angles to the cooling surface. If there is any disturbance when they are forming these columns may be bent. This theory of the arrangement of rocks is by Richardson, a German, and is generally received.

QUARTZ.
Often has flowed into depressions fissures in the rocks and most beautiful specimens are found. Silica being transparent is chalcidony. When it has the color of flesh it is called carnelian. When opaque it is Jasper. When the quartz lies in different bands it is agate. Quartz though it is very hard has been called the most polite of minerals. It readily gives way, when in a molten state to other substances even limestone.

[The professor explained the large diagram upon the wall and stated that it represented the Coast range, Cascade and part of the Blue mountains, and the Willamette and John Day valleys, between them. The strata were plainly visible, being shown in colored crayon. A number of specimens of rocks which are useful or beautiful were shown to those who remained to ask questions.—REV.]
