





South Carolina.

The following extract from Brooklyn Argus gives a brief and graphic picture of the deplorable condition of South Carolina negro rule:

"At a recent tax sale in Charleston County, South Carolina, 2,900 pieces of ground (estates) were forfeited to the State for want of bidders. "The State," in this case, means a combination, comprising such rare decoctions as "Governor" Moses, indicted for burglary, larceny, conspiracy, and seduction; ex-Congressman Bowen, a President-pardoned bigamist; ex-Congressman Whittemore, forced out of Congress for selling commissions to West Point; and a Legislature whose sixty-three members pay an aggregate of \$429 in taxes, and of whose number forty-six cannot read and write, and seventeen can. These are the precious persons who are gabbling up the land and Palmetto State. Her debt is already \$42,000,000. Her taxes are already \$5 on the \$100 of assessment and \$11 on the \$100 of valuation. The salaries of her "officials' are over \$1,000,000 a year and her voters comprise about 30,000 whites and 70,000 negroes. The State has failed. Her taxes mean conflication. Her "justice" is a farce. Her "Governors" have pardoned forty-two murderers in advance of trial. It is not anarchy that has set in. It is death. Anarchy is active and South Carolina is dead--her Governors being the valtures gorging their foul beaks in her lifeless form. The latest outcome of reconstruction does of the American people.
