The Comet Now Visible

The subjoined extract concerning the comet which is now visible in the northern heavens is taken from the article written by Professor Colburn astronomer of Dearborn College which was published in the Chicago Tribune.

Our calculations show that the "perihelion" is about 21,000 miles in diameter, and its volume about sixteen times that of the earth. The envelope streams away from it a distance of full 1,000,000 miles...

The comet is evidently developing a double tail, as shown by the streak of greater brightness which lies a little within the boundary of the appearance. This extra luminosity proves that the tail is shaped like a hollow cone, and is not solid.

On Tuesday evening the comet's distance from the sun was 65,000,000 miles, and from the earth 53,000,000 miles. This and other observations give the following corrected elements of the orbit...

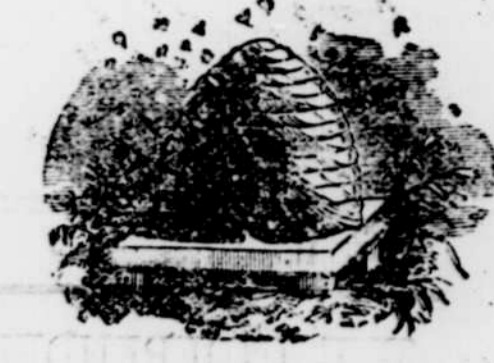
