At the last session of the logislature a law was passed to make the offices of sheriff and clerk in several counties salaried offices, but owing to the fact that several of the counties (wherein the earnings of the sheriffs and clerks were enormous.) were left out of the bill, the law was declared unconstituonal, because unequal. There was a popular demand for a law to cut down the incomes of the sheriffs and clerks, and this was the thing the Solons of the legislature gave to the people! It seems almost impossible to get any legislation now in favor of the poople that saves them any money. In Multnomah county says the Standard, the gross earnings of the exsheriff and ex-clerk for six months were over twelve thousand dollars each. or twenty four thousand dollars each for a year, or forty eight thousand dollars each for two years. Now this is simply robbing the people under cover of the law; for two thousand dollars net is ample pay for the sheriff of that county, and three thousand is good pay for the clerk. The sheriff and clerk of that county now receive larger pay than the five circuit judges combined, in fact, nearly enough to pay the present salaries of the five circuit and the three Supreme Judges.

In Washington County it is not W. Luelling received for the year ending June 80, 1882, gross earnings, \$4171.89; net earnings, \$3,312. 99. And Sheriff Hale received for the same year, gross earnings, \$2,-111.38; net earnings \$1,431.37. Though the expense for the last six months of Hale's last half year was only \$223. Now the Circuit Judge of this district gets only two thousand a year, and has to pay travelling expenses and hotel fare. Is there any justice in this? The sheriff's pay in this county, is not far from right. Good judges of the business inform us that \$1,500 a year would be good wages for the clerk and \$1,000 for the sheriff of this county, the county paying the necessary denuty hire.
