THURSDAY, APRIL 12, 1888. REPUBLICAN STATE CONVENTION.

The state republican convention convened in Portland yesterday. A full delegation was present from this county. Hon. Binger Hermann was nominated for congressman, and will doubtless be re-elected, as he has made a good record in congress. The presidential electors are Hon. C. W. Fulton, Gen. Wm. Kapus, Robert McLean, W. P. Lord was nominated for supreme judge. We have not space to give more than a few of the nominations made, hence will confine ourselves to matters in which Washington county is especially interested. T. A. McBride was nominated for reelection as prosecuting attorney of this judicial district. T. A. Moore, of St. Helens, Columbia county, received the nomination for joint senator for the counties of Washington, Columbia and Tillamook. Hon. W. D. Hare was elected alternate delegate to the national convention; T. H. Tongue, Esq., member of state central committee from Washington county.

Harmony prevailed throughout the convention, and there seems to have been enough opinion to "go round." The platform adopted is in favor of protection to American producers and manufacturers. No allusion is made to the regulation of the liquor traffic. It was doubtless regarded as a local question, and left unprejudiced to the individual action of the several counties.

"Bob" Ingersoll defines the tariff situation as follows: "The majority in this country do not believe in free trade. A large majority think it of the utmost importance to diversify and protect, when necessary, the industries of our people. A large majority, in my judgment, think the tariff ought, in many particulars, to be reformed. They know that every tariff bill that has ever been passed has been more or less deformed by compromise. They know that all the interests asking for protection combined and that some interests that ought not to be protected secured it by threats and intimidation. That is, they said: 'If you do not protect us we will not vote to protect you.' So that the desiring industries have been compelled to include many that were undeserving. Every success has its parasites. Some people are willing to destroy the success for the sake of killing the parasites, but the great majority do not feel like injuring themselves—do not feel like sacrificing a great good for the sake of destroying a small evil. So much money has been invested, so many people find employment, so many interests are interwoven with and depend upon the industries that are protected, that anything like free trade will bring, for a time at least, a ruin that will never be repaired except by resorting again to protection."

Luther B. Marsh, an old and distinguished lawyer of New York, has been "converted" to spiritualism, and has decided his residence and other valuable property to a female "medium." The success of this designing Phynx furnishes additional proof to the great mass already on hand up to the time of going to press on this, All Fools Day that "there is no fool like an old fool." Had the "medium" asked the lawyer to believe the moon is made of green cheese, without any skippers on it, he would no doubt have been "converted."

Governor Pennoyer has not met the expectations of the men who helped him to the executive office. Regardless of the charming promises of the governor, made two years ago, Chinese still inhabit our land, and compete with native laborers; and that portable railway is in the old state of innocuous desuetude. His great solicitude respecting the state democratic convention adopting a few appropriate resolutions looking to the capture of Eastern Oregon votes will be correctly interpreted by the intelligent public.

Samuel J. Tilden never spoke of his wealth, but it was variously estimated all the way from \$4,000,000 to \$10,000,000. His executors have lately stated in court that his assets footed up \$5,225,000 in real and personal property. It was also admitted that after the legacies provided for in the will are paid, over four millions will remain for the erection of three public libraries contemplated by Mr. Tilden in New York, Yonkers and New Lebanon, where he was born.

Prohibition has received a severe blow by the decision of the supreme court of Iowa, in a case involving the delivery of five thousand barrels of beer, that no state has the power to prohibit the importation of liquor from another state. The court holds that such cases come under the interstate commerce laws and must be dealt with by congress. Happy Iowa!

LAUREL COAL FIELDS.

A number of our citizens living in the mountainous district a few miles above Greenville, are considerably excited over the discovery of immense deposits of coal in that vicinity. Messrs. Bailey and Rafferty claim to have discovered ledges of such magnitude as to ultimately attract millions of capital and thousands of laborers to this county. At Long mountain a ledge is reported to have been prospected, showing a face of 500 yards, 6 feet in thickness, and extending back for not less than a mile, and croppings indicate that it may extend for five miles. In fact, the whole country seems to be richly impregnated with coal of a superior quality. Many claims have been located, and the work of "chloriders" will be pushed. Samples of the coal have been sent to the Portland board of trade, and strong efforts will be made to hasten the development of mining interests in this county, that will soon increase our wealth a thousand fold.

The existence of this inexhaustible field of wealth should be brought to the attention of capitalists, and speedy steps taken looking to the building of a railroad that will carry the precious product to market. We must have a railroad extending from Hillsboro to these coal fields. The lumbering industry needs such a road too. We are reliably informed that a railroad extending to these coal fields would open to market a large body of the choicest cedar and fir timber on the coast. Do not let the matter rest here. Urge upon capitalists the magnitude of these present inaccessible fields of hidden wealth, cause them to investigate, and when this is once done, millions will be at command to build railroads, construct mills to cut the forest into lumber and open the coal mines and bring the products to an inexhaustible market. Puget Sound owes her great wealth to coal mines and lumbering, and the same opportunities for amassing fortunes are possible in the "too heavily timbered" district of Washington county for home-seekers to hasten thither and content with the mountainous country. We can now almost see the mammoth coal bunkers, and thousands of cars in transit, the result of unearthed treasure in this county.

Jacob Sharp, king of the "boodler" aldermen of New York city, is dead. The funeral was conducted in the most secret manner, so much so in fact as to cause suspicion that the lively old man was playing possum. In his death the country loses nothing. The history of the operations of the New York "boodler" gang is one in which cunning and rascality played an important part. But at last, overmastered by the demands of an outraged public, and the operations of law, the fate of each member has been such as to cause justice to weep over the wreck of her victories.

The London Times, speaking editorially of the tariff question, said: "The United States does not look at the question from the same point of view as our ourselves. The object of their statesmen is not to secure the largest amount of wealth for the country generally, but to keep up, by whatever means, the standard of comfort among the laboring classes."

The Burlington railroad strike has cost the company \$1,500,000 and a great deal of trade which has sought other roads. The loss to the strikers is about one-tenth that sum. A little forbearance on the part of the manager would have prevented the strike. It may be a good lesson for the future. Stubborn wealth cannot compel unwilling labor.

Judge Scholfield, of Illinois, brother of Mr. Benjamin Scholfield of Hillsboro, is favorably mentioned for United States chief justice to succeed Justice Waite, lately deceased.
