How Beecher Got His Eye Teeth Cut.

I had no fondness for mathematics, yet I became proficient in its elementary branches, in my school days under the teachings of W. P. N. Fitzgerald, which in full, is William Pitt Nelson Fitzgerald. When Professor Davies, of West Point, was traveling in Canada, he was served by an hostler's boy, and in putting some questions to him, he proved so sharp at figures that the Professor took him along as a servant. He was waiter and boy of all work. But he developed such gifts and graces that he was put to his books, and became a cadet, and stood second to none, until an unfortunate Christmas soiree delivered him from the thrall of West Point, and sent him to finish his career in the great academy of the world. I found him, in 1827, teaching mathematics at Mount Pleasant Classical Institute, Amherst, Mass. He taught me to conquer in studying. There is a very hour in which young nature, tugging, discouraged and weary with books, rises with the consciousness of victorious power into masterhood. Forever after he knows that he can learn anything if he pleases. It is a distinct intellectual "conversion."

A facetious fellow, having unwittingly offended a conceited puppy, the latter told him he was no "gentleman." Are you a gentleman? "asked the droll one. Yes, sir," answered the fop. "Then, I am very glad I am not," replied the other.

Two Oxonians dining together one of them noticing a spot of grease on the neck-cloth of his companion said, "I see you are a Grecian." "Pooh!" said the other, "that is far-fetched." "No, indeed," said the punster, "I made it on the spot."

An old gentleman accused his servant of having stolen his stick. The man protested perfect innocence. "Why, you know," rejoined his master, "that the stick could never walk off with itself." "Certainly not, sir, unless it was a walking stick."

It was tough for a green boy, but it seasoned him. In less than a month I had the most intense sense of intellectual independence and courage to defend my recitations.

In the midst of a lesson, his cold and calm voice would fall upon me in the midst of a demonstration—"No!" I hesitated, stopped, and then went back to the beginning; and on reaching the same spot again—"No!" uttered with the tone of perfect conviction, barred my progress.

"The next!" and I sat down in red confusion. He, too, was stopped with "No!" but he went right on, finished, and, as he sat down, was rewarded with "Very well."

"Why," whispered I, "I recited it just as he did, and you said 'No!'" "Why didn't you say yes and stick to it? It is not enough to know your lesson. You must know that you know it! You have learned nothing till you are sure. If all the world says no, your business is to say yes, and prove it."

The foregoing contains a lesson well worthy of study and consideration by all who are engaged in the instruction of the youth. A mere parrot like recitation of the lesson given to be learned is too often accepted by the teacher in lieu of a thorough knowledge and understanding of it by the pupil. Such surface learning will always prove a stumbling block to the advancement of the scholar, and will create a habit of superficial thought fatal to the full development of his mental powers.

As the writer says, "It is not enough to know your lesson. You must know that you know it." This knowledge can only be attained by thoroughness on the part alike of teacher and pupil, and it will depend upon the teacher whether or not the pupil shall acquire that thoroughness, so essential in the acquisition of knowledge and the formation of a well educated mind.

It is found by experiments recently made by Prussian military authorities that a sheet of ice three inches thick affords a perfectly safe passage for infantry or horses marching in single file, and for light carriages; with a thickness of six inches it will bear all sorts of wagons and cannon. The strength of the ice may be increased by covering it with straw and laying planks under the wagon wheels. The last named precaution is to be recommended with heavy vehicles, even when the ice is six inches thick. All jerking and irregular motion is to be avoided, as it serves to make the ice dangerous. A few winters ago, ten or twelve young people, joining hands in an extended line, attempted to cross a pond at a smart trot, keeping step as they went. A few minutes and the ice began to oscillate, a crash followed, and the majority of the party got an improvised cold bath. The ice was found in this case to be only two inches thick, but it would probably have resisted a regular and steady movement somewhat longer.
