The heaviest grading to be done hat on the hill from Parrot creek to urora, a distance of some 21 miles. large force of hands is kept conantly employed on this section, but it ill require sixty days' steady work to omplete the grade to Aurora. From there to Salem the road bed is complete, excepting trestle-work, so that when track-laying commences the road will be advanced very rapidly to this place.
