WASHINGTON, Jue 13 .- The President has sent to Congress a message in condemnation of the atrocious manner in which the conflict in Cuba is carried on on both sides, and representing that the object of the Cubans who urge their recognition as belligerents is to embroil us in warfare, and declaring his inability to see in the present condition of Cuba those elements rehis mother. 
