Thresher on a wagon, so constructed as to
thresh the grain as it travels, and to go along-
side a header, the same as the receiving wagon
does under the present system of heading
grain.

Telegraphic Summary.

LONDON, Feb. 20.—The conference has
agreed to open, the Black Sea to foreign
men-of-war, and authorized the admis-
sion to the Dardanelles of all armed
vessels. Russia and Romania alone
accepted the terms.

A Constantinople dispatch says the
Porte objects to the Powers having more
than two ships in the Danube, and
protests against the expedition.

Brussels, Feb. 21.—It is rumored
that negotiations are pending between
the Court of Rome and the Catholic
party here, for the transfer of the Holy
See to Belgium.

Madrid, Feb. 21.—Queen Maria Vic-
toria is dangerously ill with fever, at
Alisio. She received the last sacra-
ments. A later dispatch says the report prevails
of the death of Queen Maria Victoria.

London, Feb. 21.—China papers re-
ceived by over land mail, report that
an assault was made upon Seward and
his party during their visit Hong Foo.

Washington, Feb. 20.—Senator Wil-
liams has reported the bill giving set-
tlers in the Territories right to enter
160 acres of mineral land regardless of
pre-emption laws.

Senator Miller, of Georgia was to
have been sworn in on the 24th.

The Senate Southern Pacific Rail-
road bill has passed the House with
Fremont, Dodge, Forney, Alcorn and
86 others as incorporators as before.

The Joint High Commission will
commence its labor next week; all the
English Commissioners are present and
all the American members save Judge
Hoar. The Canadian claims from Fe-
ruian raids will probably come before
them. The English Government are
going to present these claims for im-
mediate settlement.

New York, Feb. 20.—The steamship
North America, from Rio Jenero, via
St. Thomas, just arrived, brings news
of the safe arrival of the Tennessee at
San Domingo.

the week; 7,800 head to day; market
steady and firmer, at 5 1/2 @ 8 for Ohio,
averaging 78 lbs, to Canadas averaging
140 lbs.

HOGS—Receipts of 18,000 head for
the week and 30 car loads to-day worth
8 @ 8 1/2; western dressed at 9 1/4 @ 9 1/2 closed
week.

San Francisco, March 1.—Flour—Oregon
brands can be had at 85 6 1/2 to
85 75 for superfine, and 86 75 @ 87 for
extra. The jobbing rates city brands,
85 50 @ 75. Interior mills selling
about 25c. per barrel less. There is no
demand for export, and the local trade
is quiet. Superfine in sks of 196 lbs,
85 75 @ 86; extra in sks, 86 87 1/2 @ 87.

Wheat—Four large vessels are under
engagement to load, one of which is tak-
ing on a cargo at Vallejo. Rates for
fair to choice shipping range from
\$2 20 to \$2 30, and for fair to choice
milling from \$2 25 to \$2 35.

Versailles, Feb. 27.—The Emperor
has sent the following dispatch to the
Empress Augusta.

"With a deeply moved heart, and
gratitude to God, I inform you that
the preliminaries of peace have been
signed. The Bordeaux Assembly must
yet ratify."

London, Feb. 27.—The Telegraph
says Thiers has proposed the purchase
of Luxemburg by France, and its
transfer to Germany if Metz is restored.

State Items.

[Gleanings from State Exchanges.]
East of the mountains the demand
for fat beef cattle from Portland, Pu-
get Sound and Victoria is increasing
rapidly.

Last week a lot of potatoes was
shipped from Portland to Corvallis
where they readily sold for \$1 50 per
bushel. Won't Mr. Holladay hurry up
the west side railroad, so that Benton
county can import her potatoes for less
money.

A surgical operation was performed
last Wednesday upon a stage driver
from Albany in Salem. It took more
than five times as much chloroform to
place him under its influence than the
average of men. The medical students
of the Institute attended to see the
operation.

MINING.—A few "moon eyed Celestials"
are mining on Cow Creek, in
Douglas county, with very small pay.
The Oilla mines are being worked to a
limited extent. We have not heard a
word about the beach mines in Curry
county, for some time. The Bohema
quartz mining proved to be a "steam-
boat."

An officer of Oakland, Douglas coun-
ty, arrived in Eugene City by Monday
evening's stage in charge of a Dutch
ingrate, going by the name of Dr. Foy,
whom he was taking to Albany to
answer charges for obtaining money un-
der false pretences. He borrowed \$250
of parties in Albany and then left.
This Dr. is said to be the same individ-
ual who married a young girl in Port-
land a short time ago and took her to
Victoria and deserted her, leaving her
without money and among strangers.
We are about to forget to say, however
that he escaped from the officer on Mon-
day night, and has not been seen since.

COLLISION.—We learn that a collision
occurred on one of the switch tracks
at Albany on Saturday. We learn that
the freeman being left in charge of the
locomotive attempted the process of
shifting cars by means of switching off
and on the main track. Having got
under headway with a train, in order to
give the rear cars impetus to run some
distance after being uncoupled, the lo-
comotive was switched off, running of
course at considerable speed. The fire
man didn't shut off steam and put on
brakes quick enough, and the locomotive
colided with a box car standing on
the switch with sufficient force to break
the latter considerably, and to knock
the locomotive's head light "galley
west." Nobody hurt—the only damage
being to property.

The Oregonian gives an account of
letters from Baker City, dated Feb. 19
and 22d, which gives accounts of very
rich discoveries of silver leads on Burnt
river, between Miller's station and
Old's Ferry. The ledges of which par-
ticular mention is made was discovered
by the stage driver who drives on that
route. There is great excitement at
Baker City, and many are going up to
look for feet. One of the parties inter-
ested had melted three ounces of rock,
from which was obtained six cents worth
of pure silver. The ledge is considered
richer than anything ever discovered
on side of White Pine. Capt. Fisk,
who has no interest will start for Burnt
river in two or three days. The same
letters give some account, too, of late
discoveries of gold bearing quartz.

WHITFIELD AND THE THUNDER
STORM.—On one occasion Mr Whitfield
was preaching in Boston, on the wonders
of creation, providence and redemption
when a violent tempest of thunder and
lightning came on. In the midst of the
sermon it attained so alarming height
that the congregation sat in almost
breathless awe. The preacher closed
his note book, and stepping into one of
the wings of the desk, fell on his knees,
and with much feeling and fine taste re-
peated.

"Hark! the Eternal rends the sky!
A mighty voice before Him goes—
A voice of music to his friends,
But threatening thunder to His foes,
Come children, to your father's arms,
Hide in the chamber of My grace,
Till the fierce storm be overborne,
And My revenging fury cease."

"Let us devoutly sing, to the praise and
glory of God, this hymn, Old Hundred"

The whole congregation instantly
arose and poured forth the sacred song,
in which they were nobly accompanied
by the organ, in a style of pious grand-
eur and heartfelt praise. By the time
the hymn was finished, the storm was
hushed; and the sun, bursting forth,
showed through the magnificent and
brilliant arch of peace. The preacher
resumed the desk and his discourse,
with this opposite quotation;

"Look upon the rainbow; praise Him
that made it. Very beautiful it is in the
brightness thereof! It compasseth the
heaven about with a glorious circle; and
the hands of the Most High have ben-
edicted it."

The remainder of the service was
calculated to sustain that elevated feel-
ing which had been produced; and the
benediction with which the good man
dismissed the flock was universally re-
ceived with streaming eyes and
hearts overflowing with tenderness and
gratitude.—The Methodist.

uary, A. D. 1871, between D. C. Dougherty, of the
County of Polk and State of Oregon of the
first part, and Isaac F. Street, of the County
and State above named of the second part.

WITNESSETH: That the said party of the
first part, the said party of the second part,
have this day entered into a partnership for
the purpose of working and running a Saw
Mill, situated on the Yamhill River, in the
County and State above named, and known as
the Babcock Mill, and carrying on a general
lumbering business.

The said party of the first part agrees to fur-
nish one half of the labor, and bear one half
of the necessary expenses for furnishing logs,
material, and whatever is necessary to keep
the said mill in good running order, and to
have one half of the proceeds thereof.

The intention of this agreement is such that
neither the said party of the first part, nor
the said party of the second part, shall contract
any company debts, or contract any company
business without the written consent of the
party of the other part.

Should either of the said parties to this
agreement transact any business without first
obtaining the consent of the other party in
writing, then the said party not giving his
consent, cannot be held for the payment of
such debts contracted.

And it is further agreed by and between the
