Wood Wanted. Those indebted to the Oregon REPUBLICAN will confer a favor by furnishing us some wood, which will be as good as cash to us.

We this week commence the second volume of the Oregon REPUBLICAN.

The March term of the County Court, Judge Myers presiding, was in session this week. No business of importance before the Court.

The Portland mails failed to reach us on Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, owing to high water.

The weather for the past week has been so rainy that but little has been done by way of business in any line. There has been considerable plowing done the past winter, and the farmers are now anxiously waiting for a change of weather more favorable for seeding. There will be more seeding than common done this spring, if the rains do not continue too late.

Several citizens of Polk County have concluded to emigrate as soon as spring opens, and have now gone to Eastern Oregon to pick out some location, preparatory to moving their families. Mr. W. G. Campbell, Reuben Pigg, and several others started last Wednesday morning. They design visiting Burch Creek, John Days, and the Ochoco country before returning.

Telegraphic Summary.

WASHINGTON, March 5.—The Act in relation to telegraphic communication between the United States and foreign countries, although presented to the President in time, failed to receive his approval. It is certain he had the bill, but withheld his signature.

It is not certain that the Senate will concur in the House resolution to adjourn sine die on Wednesday. Some Senators are disposed to remain in session until the San Domingo Commissioners report.

Washington, March 6.—The probable length of the present session is the common topic of conversation. Members of the House and Senate who have canvassed the latter body feel confident that the resolution passed by the House on Saturday, fixing the time of adjournment for Monday, March, 13th will be agreed to. The vote on adjournment on Wednesday next will be very close. Those in favor of a short session will attempt to have the matter settled on Tuesday, since, if no arrangement is made this week, so many bills will be introduced that it will be a month or two before an adjournment can be obtained.

Bordeaux, March 5.—Picard has arrived. It is probable that the Assembly will be transferred to Fontainebleau on leaving Bordeaux.

Several employees belonging to the Radicals have left Havre and gone to Paris.

It is expected that as soon as definite negotiations for the treaty of peace are commenced at Brussels—probably about the 10th or 11th inst.—the Government will be ready to pay 500,000,000 francs on account of the war indemnity to free Paris from the proximity of German troops.

Regiments of the line will quit the Capital and be replaced by 4,000 picked men, who will form a provisional corps.

Versailles, March 5.—The 2d Army Corps has commenced its march homeward. The headquarters of the Emperor and Von Moltke will be removed from Versailles on Tuesday. Bismarck will follow the Emperor.

London, March 5.—The report of intrigues for the restoration of the Bonapartes are untrue. Napoleon confidently awaits the popular decision, and abstains from all efforts to influence it.

Berlin, March 4.—The Emperor will return to Berlin in about eight days. Prince Frederick Charles has been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the army occupation in France, with headquarters at Rheims.

Thiers will decline to make a treaty of commerce with Germany, on the ground that it is necessary for France to join the United States and restore the equilibrium of high tariff.

Berlin is brilliantly illuminated at night.

Paris, March 4.—Not a German soldier remain here. The Saxons passed out at 10 o'clock yesterday morning, marching in front of the Arch de Triomphe amid profound silence. There were few spectators. By noon the evacuation was complete. The German Emperor afterwards reviewed 100,000 men in the Bois De Boulogne. The Prussian leaders are disappointed at the coldness and implacable attitude of the Parisians.

Several journals resumed publication to day. They are unanimous in the opinion that the impression produced by the preliminary terms of peace are very bad, and declared that no good can be real when obtained under such conditions; they recommend calmness and concord as the means of making the country great and prosperous.

The city is quiet to day. A number of persons suspected of being spies have been arrested by the people, and several women who were seen talking with the Prussians on the Champs Elysees were severely handled. The minister of the Interior, in a proclamation, congratulates the inhabitants on their attitude during the occupation of the city.

Versailles, March 4.—All quiet at present, but the National Guard are becoming rather troublesome.

It is believed that the Emperor will review the First Army Corps at Amiens. From Amiens he will go to Rouen; then again to Amiens; thence to Compeigne, where he will remain for one day, and thence leave for Berlin.

The French Minister at Athens will be charged to regulate the details of the definite treaty of peace at Brussels.

It has been decided to remove from the general depot all ammunition, for the better defence of the city.

The rioters threatened an outbreak at St. Pelegie last night. The regular troops remained firm, but the National Guards fell back. San Francisco, March 8.—Mr. Holladay has made arrangements for sending 50,000 German emigrants to Oregon to settle the lands of the Oregon & California R. R. Co. A line of steamers will be put on to run direct from Bremen to Aspinwall, connecting with a new and independent line to be established between Panama and San Francisco and Portland, the organization of which is about completed. Passengers will be landed in Oregon from Bremen at a cost not exceeding \$70.

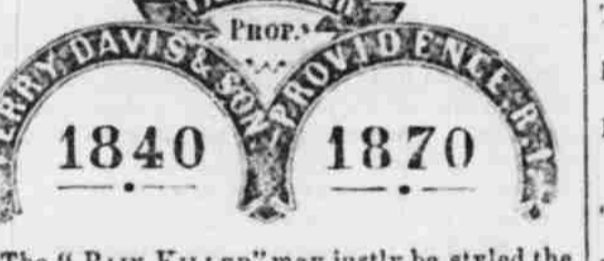
