Another Shooting Affair. Last Saturday, as
the West Side mail was going down, a difficulty
arose between the carrier, Wm. Hopkins, and
the Post Master, Mr. Hunsaker, at Perrydale,
in this county. The carrier rode off, and
Mr. Hunsaker he would "settle with him to-morrow."
The morning (Sunday) came, and after
Hunsaker had changed the mail, which
Hopkins had brought up from below, Hopkins
told him he was ready to settle that trouble,
and commenced to pull off his coat. Hunsaker
began to pull off his coat, when his wife
interfered, and tried to take him away. At
this juncture, Hopkins drew a Derringer and
fired at Hunsaker, without, however, doing any
damage. Hopkins went on his way. A warrant
was issued here by Justice Stiles, and the
Sheriff sent after Hopkins. He was arrested at
Corvallis, and brought back by the Sheriff, and
taken before Justice Stiles for examination.
The Attorney for defendant demanded his
release, on the ground that the warrant was
imperfect, and that the Court had no right to
hold the prisoner. The Court granted the
demand, released the prisoner, who immediately
"departed," and has not since been heard from.

Telegraphic Summary.

PARIS, May 1.—The Commune has
revoked the order for the arrest of Gen.
Cluseret.
A series of barricades are being
built to completely encircle the city.
Dombrowski is now in command on
the bank of Seine outside of the walls.
Free Masons take turns with the
Nationals in guarding the banners of
the Order on the ramparts, and do duty
bravely under a terrible fire.
Versailles, May 1.—Negotiations for
the surrender of Fort Issy failed, and the
bombardment recommenced. It is
now very violent.
In the Assembly to day Picard stated
that the municipal election through
France passed quietly yesterday, except
at Lyons.
London, May 1.—In the House of
Commons the debate on the budget was
resumed. W. H. Smith, member for
Westminster, moved the following:
Resolved, That in the opinion of the
House it is expedient to increase the
rate of taxation on incomes.
He argued to show that the addition-
al burden would fall exclusively on
small incomes.
Granville, in the House of Lords to
night, declined to answer questions
respecting negotiations for the settlement
of San Juan Island boundary question
with the United States. He stated
that the Government was under obliga-
tions of secrecy until a treaty and ratifica-
tion were exchanged.
In the House of Commons Harcourt
and Healey made bitter attacks on the
budget. Lowe defended it, and said
Government presented the best avail-
able substitute for impost rejected by
the House.
Versailles, May 2.—Fort Issy is com-
pletely surrounded by victors.
Last night chasseurs captured Clamart
railway station at the point of the
bayonet. Three insurgents were killed.
Simultaneous two regiments attacked
Chateau Issy, defense of which the in-
surgents temporarily abandoned.
Paris, May 2.—The Republic says the
Versaillais attacked Fort Issy but were
repulsed last night. The bombardment
of Vanvres Montrogue continues to-day.
An engagement is expected before
evening. The Versaillais are gaining
ground daily. The reconquest of
Issy is contradicted. The fort is de-
serted. Fifteen thousand Nationals
carried the barricades at Lower Issy.
It is rumored that Dombrowski and
staff are made prisoners at Asnieres.
The Commune decries a committee
of public safety. Cluseret's arrest was
ordered because of negligence, whereby
Fort Issy was compromised.
London, May 2.—The Daily News
says 25,000 troops have been sent
against the insurgents, making sorties
by Choisy. A great battle is expected
to-morrow. A new army is forming at
Auxerie.

New York, May 2.—A special cor-
respondent telegraphs the following:
Berlin—Sunday—An imperial council
was held to-day to consider the
situation of Paris. Bismarck was
present. It was agreed to notify the Ver-
saillais government that a further limited
period would be allowed for the re-
stitution of authority, enforcement of
order and fulfillment of the treaty stipu-
lation, after which, Germany will take
independent action to establish law and
order. The dispatch will emphasize
the wish of Germany not to interfere
with the internal political affairs of
France, but will add that such inter-
minable civil war, originating in revolution
and characterized by disgraceful
excesses, cannot longer be tolerated,
for the moral and material interests of
Germany, as well as of all Europe are
suffering.

Washington, May 2.—Justice Clif-
ford read the brief and papers in the
legal tender cases—Knox vs. Lee, and
Parker vs. Davis & Ballous. In these
two there were two questions heretofore
directed to be argued: 1st. Is the
act of Congress, known as the Legal
Tender Act, constitutional as to con-
tracts made before its passage? 2d. Is
it valid as applicable to transactions since
its passage? The questions have been
considered by the court and both decid-
ed in the affirmative. The decree of
the Supreme Judicial Court of Mas-
sachusetts, in the case of Parker vs.
Davis, is therefore affirmed, and the
judgment of the Circuit Court of the
United States of the District of Texas
is also affirmed.

In the cases of Dunning against Sears
and others, two cases from the Supreme
Court of Michigan, contracts were for
the delivery of a specified weight of
gold, removable as coined money. The
court below held that they were dis-
charged by the payment of treasury
notes, equivalent in market value of
coined money of stipulated weight of
pure gold. This court reversed that
judgment, holding that it should have
been entered for coined dollars and
parts of dollars.

Raleigh, N. C. May 1.—W. C. Har-
rison, a Holden Republican, was elected
Mayor of this city to-day by the Demo-
crats, the strength of the Republican
party, including a majority of the negroes,
supporting C. L. Harris, also a
Holden Republican. The Mayor elect
is a brother of Mrs. Governor Holden.

Ex-Governor Manley died to-day
aged 75 years.

The Why and Wherefore.

The Havre Republican, published at
Havre De Grace, Md., has always a
good word for home interests and
American labor. In the following brief
editorial Mr. McCombs has given the
Arguments for Protection:
Protection fosters and develops home
productions and domestic manufactures.
There is no getting over that.
Free trade encourages foreign man-
ufactures and necessarily depresses home
industries. There is no getting over
that. Then why is this great free
trade crusade against American man-
ufactures? Who are these free trade
advocates? What interest do they
present?
The whole free trade movement is
anti-American in its inception, gotten
up and supported by British gold in the
aid and interest of British manufactur-
ers and London book publishers, brok-
ers and insurance companies and their
agents in Boston and New York, and
American imports and dealers in foreign
merchandise, stocks, and securities, and
who have no interest in common with
the great mass of the people, or their
home industries—except as they afford
nourishment to these vampires and their
paid emissaries.
If American manufacturers are reap-
ing such immense fortunes, and the
road is so open to wealth in this direc-
tion, as these free traders would have us
believe, why don't they change their
occupation, "accept the situation" and
take a hand?
Not until the intelligent workmen of
the country are, by a reduction of
wages, brought to the pitiful condition
of the pauper laborers of Europe, can
we afford to do without Protection, and
every man who advocates free trade is
helping to bring about such a state of
things.

Every consideration of patriotism,
love of country and humanity, demand
Protection to American industries,
against the foreign monied monopolies
that fatten on the pauper labor of Eu-
rope.
