A meeting of the patrons of Dallas school is
called by the officers of the district, to be held
at the School House next Saturday, to ascertain
the wishes of the people concerning
scholars attending the school and residing out-
side the district.

The weather for the past week has been a
fair sample of westerly winter-rain almost
incessantly. This will have a beneficial effect
on late sown grain, and will insure an abun-
dant harvest, both of grain and grass. An
unusually large amount of grain has been
sown, and the prospects now, with the almost
entire failure of crops in California, are that
the farmers in Oregon will be well remunerated
for their labors.

Woolen Factory. Matters are assuming a
more business-like aspect concerning the
above-named establishment, and a proposition
will be made in due season to the citizens of
Dallas for building here instead of re-building
at Ellendale. The question should be thor-
oughly canvassed by our citizens, and all
influences held out for its establishment
here, as there is nothing which more perma-
nently benefits a town than well-established
manufactories.

place, met with a painful accident last Tues-
day, while running a planing machine. He
was standing on the right hand side of the
table, and placing his left hand on the opposite
edge, reached over to get an oil can. His hand
was closer to the knives than he supposed, and
as he reached over the table, the thumb of his
left hand came in contact with one of the
knives, and was immediately severed close to
the hand. This will prevent him from per-
forming any work for some time, but as he has
workmen employed in his shop, it will not
retard the progress of his business.

Telegraphic Summary.

PARIS, May 15.—The Versailles
forces are under the walls of Paris,
exchanging shots with the insurgents
who line ramparts from the arrondissement
of Passy to Porte Issy. The
Parisians have been expelled from the
tranches between Vanvres and Issy. A
battery has been erected in the garden
of the Tuilleries to pour a flank fire
into Champs Elysees.

There is undoubted evidence that a
wide spread conspiracy exists in Paris
for the overthrow of the Commune.

The Gardens of Luxembourg are
closed to the public, and are occupied
by a military force in anticipation of a
rising on the part of the populace.

M. Beslay, called the father of the
Commune, retires from membership of
that body because the residence of
Thiers has been despoiled.

La Crelia is now in command of Little
Vanvres.

Corps commanders will hereafter
command arrondissements and be respon-
sible for their defense.

Paris, May 14.—Yesterday Dom-
browski issued orders that all officers
refusing to obey the commands of superi-
ors should be shot.

Yesterday a procession of women
marched through the streets to the Hotel
de Ville, where they demanded arms. A
proclamation was issued for the orga-
nization of battalions of women, for
the purpose of stimulating the courage
of the men. It is ordered that all
cowardly males shall be led to prison
by women. Battalions of women are
to march against the Versaillesists.

The bombardment is very violent,
and shells are falling within the city in
large numbers.

A heavy attack from the Versailles
is expected.

It is said that seven men and a
large number of young women, bearing
ambulance with a red cross, were re-
fused quarter by the Sixth Regiment,
who shot five of them.

The Committee on War has been re-
placed in consequence of difficulties
with the Central Committee.

The batteries at Montretoul are fir-
ing on Paris.

Rosell is reported to be in Belgium.
Troops in the Bois de Boulogne are
advancing. Their entry into the city is
imminent.

Versailles, May 15.—Sixty cannon
were found in Forte Vanvres on its
occupation by Versaillesists.

The battery at Montretoul continues
to cannonade the insurgents' work,
and is demolishing the enciente of
Paris and protecting the approaches of
the Government troops.

The bombardment continues, and se-
vere breaches are already made in the
enciente of Paris, Antsuiel gate is
entirely destroyed.

Vienna, May 15.—Twenty-eight
Archbishops and Bishops of the Catho-
lic Church have addressed a petition
to the Emperor of Austria on the Roman
question. In the petition the
Emperor is requested to inform the
King of Italy that the independence
of the Pope is necessary to the Catho-
lic Church, and to demand that Rome
and suitable territory be immediately
returned to the Pope. The petitioners
also say it is the duty of all other
Catholic Powers, and of Protestant
Powers also, to make a similar demand.

New York, May 15.—The Execu-
tive Committee of the Evangelical has
resolved to convene the general Pro-
testant Conference, postponed last year
on account of war in Europe, in the
Spring or Fall of eighteen hundred and
seventy-three in this city.

Viscount Godrich, and Mr. Chremer
of the Joint High Commission, left
here Saturday for San Francisco.

London, May 15.—In the House
of Commons to-night Viscount Eofield,
Under Secretary of Foreign affairs,
said the Government was not prepared
to state the exact terms of the treaty
of Washington, as a copy of the docu-
ment has not yet been received.

Disraeli therefore postponed putting
the question to the Government in
relation thereto, of which he had previ-
ously given notice.

Gladstone stated that the Govern-
ment was unable to anticipate the ex-
act time of the arrival of the treaty,
but promised that it should instantly
be submitted to Parliament.

In the House of Lords, Earl Russell
gave notice of intention to move an
address to the Queen against sanctioning
the ratification of the Alabama treaty.

A dispatch from Berlin gives some
additional particulars of the treaty
of peace just negotiated at Frankfurt.
The French are to restore all ships
captured during the war or to refund
their value in cases where the vessels
have been sold. The navigation treaty
of 1862 is to be manifested. All du-
ties to be abolished in Alsace after six
months.

London, May 16.—A Times dis-
patch from Paris says M. Pyatt openly
declares the fall of the Commune im-
minent. The National Guards decline
to march, and talk of opening the gates
to the Versaillesists. Dombrowski or-
ders are not obeyed.

The Versaillesists have been driven
back to Longchamps from positions in
the Bois de Boulogne. It is reported
that two Versailles battalions were de-
cimated on Friday night.

his business matters were in such a
condition that he could neither safely
or honorably leave them. The lady was
in New Orleans and—well they were
just for each other, while the old folks
severely told them that they could not
