Telegraphic Summary.

PARIS, June 18.—It is reliably
stated that Jules Ferris is appointed
Minister to Washington in place of
Frielhard who returns to France.

Republican journals united in mani-
festo in answering to the editorial pro-
gramme of the monarchical press. They
declare that a Republic is the only ratio-
nal and legitimate expression of Na-
tional "sovereignty"; Monarchy implies
its abjection. They will give their
support only to candidates pledged
to maintain *status in quo*.

The French loan will be issued on
the 20th inst. if the Assembly passes
a bill authorizing it before that date.

La Verite says the siege will be raised
on the 26th.

Duke de Chartres is candidate for
Assembly in La Vendee.

Journal de Paris reports the names
of Central Committee of Federal Na-
tional Guard, with Dumora for Presi-
dent and Reynolds Beard as Vice-
President.

Count Burgzoo has been appointed
Minister to Hague.

Crowds of visitors are arriving by
every train. Business improving and
city healthy.

The official journal abuses strongly
a portion of the British press for hos-
tility to France, and stigmatizes their
misre resentations as coldblooded and
cowardly, and charges some writers of
being bribed both during and since the war.

The German troops have evacuated
Chantilly.

Vienna June 18.—In the Hungarian
Delegation last week the Sub-Com-
mittee, to whom the subject was refer-
red, agreed to recommend a vote of
confidence in the Government's policy
of peace. Prime Minister von Bismarck,
in addressing the committee, said the
Government harbored no design against
Germany.

Brussels, June 18.—Churches and
many houses are illuminated to-night in
honor of the Pappal anniversary, but the
celebration is attended with some dis-
order. Violent anti-Pappal demon-
strations are made by large crowds who
pass through the streets and smash
illuminated windows. The troops still
keep within the forts, but a force of
special constables has been called out,
and several arrests have been made.

The King and Queen of Belgium
have congratulated the Pope on the
25th anniversary of his Pontificate.

Dublin, June 19.—A gang of men,
supposed to be Fenians, broke into the
military armory at Millow, on Saturday
night, and carried off one hundred and
twenty rifles. The sentinel fired upon
the men as they were leaving, but all
escaped. Some of them were discov-
ered this morning in a neighboring field.
Five persons have been arrested on
suspicion.

Paris, June 19.—Besse's father and
mother implore Thiers to liberate
him.

The press continues to attack the
Bonapartists.

Eggs and the Siecle urge a Republic
lean Union against the Prussians, their
real enemies.

London, June 18.—The Prussians
have evacuated Rouen, and 8,700 have
left St. Denis and Guise.

Rouber is expected in Paris.

Paris June 19.—There are indications
of a renewal of the insurrection.

Militants of working men insult
the soldiers and attempt their assasina-
tion.

Incendiarists continue.

During the last two days twenty-nine
officers of the Commune have been
arrested. Half of them were foreign.

The proclamation of the Central
Committee and its organization excites
great dismay.

London, June 10.—Emperor Will-
iam goes to-morrow to meet the Czar

Brussels, June 19.—A special cor-
respondent says the civil authorities
were compelled to intervene to main-
tain order. The troops used their bay-
onets and several were hurt. The in-
ternationals were the ringleaders.

The Spanish Committee on the Bud-
get approved Moreto's bill indemnifying
the Bank of France.

market unchanged. No large sales.

Dayton, O., June 20.—At the fune-
ral of Vallandigham to-day, there was
an immense concourse of people. The
procession was two miles long. Many
distinguished gentlemen from all parts
of the Union were present. He was
buried by the Masonic fraternity.

A DEAD HORSE.

Is he Worth More than the Living
Animal.

The scientific American recently con-
tained an article on the uses to which
dead horses can be applied, in the course
of which it is remarked that the animal
must be a remarkably good one if he
is worth as much when alive as he is
to the resorts and kettles of the
chemist. As soon as the horse is dead
his blood is sought by the manufac-
turers of albumen, and by sugar re-
finers, and the burners of lampblack.
Not a drop is allowed to go to waste.

The mane and tail are wanted for
haircloth, sieves, bow strings, and
brushes. The skin is converted into
leather for cart harness, for boots and
shoes, and strong collars. The hoofs
are used for combs, horn work, glue,
and in old times were the chief source
of hartshorn, now obtained from the
gas-house. The flesh is boiled down in
the rendering vat, and much oil and fat
are obtained from it. Some of the
choice bits may find their way into
cheap restaurants, and play the part of
beefsteak, or help enrich the hasty plates
of soup of the establishments. The
flesh left after all has been extracted
from it that is of any service is some-
times burned, to be used as manure, or
is worked up into nitrogenous com-
pounds, such as the cyanides, to be
used by the photographer in taking our
pictures. The stomach and intestines
make valuable strings and cords for
musical instruments, and out of the
bones so many useful articles are man-
ufactured that it is almost impossible
to make out a complete list of them.

Among them are buttons, toys two zers,
knife handles, rulers, cups, dominoes,
balls, and the residue from all these
things is burnt into bone black to be
used by the sugar-refiner, who puts in
a second claim on the dead horse; and
some part of the backbone is burned
white; to be used by the assayer and
refiner have finished with it, it is con-
verted into super-phosphate, to serve as
a valuable manure on our land. The
teeth are used as substitutes for ivory,
and the iron shoes, if not nailed over
the door to insure good fortune to the
household, are worked up into excellent
wrought metal. Some portion of the
bone black is converted into phosphorus
for the manufacture of matches, and
lately a valuable bread preparation is
made of the phosphate, and medicines
are prepared for the cure of consump-
tives.
