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State Items.

[Gleanings from State Exchanges.] The Oregonian says: Major Robert of the U. S. A Kalamazoo letter to the Vancouver Register says that a steam navigation company, of which General Sprague is a leading spirit, has been organized, and articles of incorporation will be filed at Olympia at once.

VALUABLE WATER POWER.—The Eugene City Manufacturing Co. have the right of way for a ditch to bring water from the Willamette river from a point on the McVay place to the head of the slough which now furnishes their mills.

The hotels in this city are doing a thriving business. The Shade House has about eighty regular boarders, and will soon be obliged to enlarge its accommodations.

EXPECTANT ASTORIA.—A genuine sensation has been enjoyed by Astoria during the last week or two. We let a chronicler of that town tell it, copying from one of his letters to the McMinnville paper.

From the Oregonian we take the following: The new town of Cornelius has not disturbed the equilibrium of Hillsboro. The two towns are but three miles apart. The County Commissioners with an eye to the future, are ready to make a bold strike and secure the county seat at Hillsboro by erecting a new Court House.

During the past year Forest Grove has improved greatly. A number of fine residences have been erected, and the town wears an air of prosperity.

Since the late rains the fall wheat fields are becoming quite green. A nugget of pure gold worth \$100 was picked up a few days ago in French Gulch, Baker county.

Many suits are pending in the Circuit Court for Lane county to obtain rights of way for the Railroad.

J. M. Breeding, one and a-half miles south of Eugene, has sold his farm of 400 acres to a Californian emigrant for \$5,182.

Ten persons have arrived direct from Tennessee, to Douglas county. They come from San Francisco to the Umpqua by steamer.

A fellow got into John Rast's brewery at Corvallis the other night and emptied his kegs, spilling 250 gallons of "der pulley lager beer."

A letter received here yesterday from Illinois states that in the western portion of that State there is considerable excitement in relation to Oregon, and that early next year a large emigration from that State may be expected.

There is a rumor in circulation to the effect that the owners of the tugboat at the mouth of Columbia river intend to withdraw her from the Bar and place her on the river route as a tow boat.
