Telegraphic Summary.

PARIS, Dec. 16.—The budget of the
Minister of Finance, Ponceur Quartier,
shows a surplus of fourteen million
francs.

A bill for the partial renewal of the
Chamber has been rejected by a Com-
mittee of the Assembly by a majority
of one.

BERNE, Dec. 16.—The Federal As-
sembly has passed a bill interdicting the
establishment of the Order of Jesuits in
Switzerland.

NEW YORK, Dec. 16.—The Execu-
tive Committee of the Union Pacific
Railroad Company, at a meeting in
this city to-day, in consideration of the
donation of Douglas county bonds and
depot grounds at Omaha, on the 1st day
of January, that city resolved to make
that place the actual terminus of the
Union Pacific Railroad.

James Waldron, on the 29th ult.,
shot himself in the store of Owen
Gardner, No. 491 Third Avenue, hav-
ing just returned from California with
a considerable sum of money. He died
at 8 45 this morning, at Bellevue Hos-
pital, from the effect of the self-inflicted
wound. It will be remembered that
he was missing for several days, and
was at last discovered by his friends at
Bellevue.

The Star says it has information that
Mrs. Garvey, wife of plasterer Garvey,
arrived in this city yesterday from
Switzerland, and that she is instructed
by her husband to say that on condi-
tion of his not being prosecuted, he will
disclose all he knows concerning the
Krug frauds. She intimates that her
husband's revelations will implicate
Mayor Hall, Sweeney and Henry
Smith. Her proposition has not yet
been replied to by Charles O'Connor.

Los Angeles, December 15.—The
police this morning arrested Julius
Carville, who broke jail at San Bernar-
dino two years ago and fled to Arizona,
and was imprisoned at Tucson for a
crime committed there, again broke jail
and escaped to this city. He will be re-
turned to San Bernardino.

Jacksonville, December 15.—Geo.
Tibbie, the young man who was put-
tily cowarded by the Misses Ralls in
this place, has been arrested on the
charge of perjury, and bound over to
the sum of \$500 to answer at the next
term of court.

It is again asserted that Stewart E.
Member of the Cuban Congress, will
take the place of Tweed as Commis-
sioner of Public Works.

Boston, Dec. 16.—In Lynn, this
morning, William Brown killed his
wife by stabbing her with a dirk.

Colonel Lawrence, who jumped from
the window of a house yesterday, in a
fit of insanity, died to-day.

Richmond, Dec. 16.—Gov. Walk-
er pardoned Ex-Mayor Calhoun, heret-
ofore twice convicted of complicity in
the Hannestriu forgeries.

Savannah, Dec. 16.—Collector Rob-
b vetoed an appropriation to pay inter-
est on gold bonds.

The Ku Kluxists were discharged
to-day, except two from Dade county.

The Internationals this evening
made arrangements for a parade to-
morrow.

Washington, Dec. 16.—A weather
report says a rain storm probably ac-
companied with high winds, is ap-
parently threatening the coast of Califor-
nia.

The Republican Senators are in
caucus to-day on Trumbull's proposi-
tion in connection with the Committee
on Retrenchment.

House.—Mr. Snapp offered a res-
olution for the abolition of the printing
and transporting of public documents
at the public expense. Referred.

Mr. Garfield from the Committee on
Appropriations, reported a bill autho-
rizing the Secretary of the Treasury
to purchase at private sale the remainder
of the square of ground on which the
Post Office building of Chicago recently
stood, not now owned by the Govern-
ment.

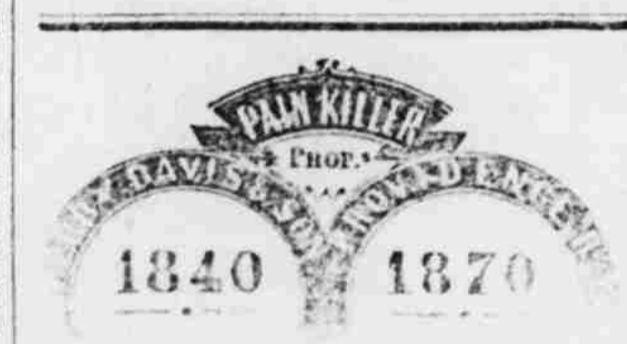
