Telegraphic Summary.

Paris, Jan. 29.—Count de Chambord
has issued a proclamation to the French
people. The Count claims as of yore the
right Divine, and says: I shall never ab-
dicate my claim to the throne of France.
I shall never forsake the monarchical
principles which I have preserved intact
for forty years, and which is the best
hope of France's greatness and liber-
ties.

Paris, Jan. 27.—A plan for a Repub-
lican revolutionary uprising has been dis-
covered over the whole Territory of the
South of France. The movement was
held ready for immediate commence-
ment in case of Theirs' resignation of
the Presidency, resulting in the appoint-
ment of Duke Daumale or Marshal
McMahon to the Chief Executive au-
thority.

London, January 28.—A messenger
left the Foreign Office yesterday with
important dispatches for Lord Lyons,
British Ambassador in France. These
dispatches state definitely the attitude
of the English Government with regard
to the commercial treaty between the
two nations, and are intended to rectify
the misapprehensions which have pre-
vailed in France as to the position of
England on the subject.

Washington, January 28.—It is said
among the Republican members of the
House of Representatives that the House
will pass the Senate resolution for the
adjournment of Congress on the 29th of
May.

Reports from official sources in Cuba
are to the effect that the atrocities of the
Coolie Slave Trade which have recently
been brought to the public cognizance,
will arrest attention and excite horror
wherever the English language is spoken.

Leading members of the House say
there is no probability of Utah being
admitted as a State.

There have been 109,000 coolies in-
troduced into Cuba since 1847.

The Secretary of the Treasury has di-
rected the Assistant Treasurer at New
York to purchase a million in bonds on
the first, third and fifth Thursdays in
February.

Washington, Jan. 29. The appoint-
ment bill as it passed the Senate fixes
the number of members of the House of
Representatives at 243.

London, Jan. 30.—At a meeting of
Electors of Birmingham last night, a
letter was read from John Bright ex-
pressing the hope that he would be able
to attend a portion of the forthcoming
Parliament.

London, Jan. 29.—An arrival at
Liverpool brings the report that the Fed-
eral grand jury had found true bills
against Gov. Davis and Secretary of
State Newberry, on account of irreg-
ularities in the late election.

St. Louis, Jan. 29.—The extensive
works of the St. Louis brass and hard-
ware manufacturing company, the com-
mission house of Hethel & Co., and the
tobacco factory of Morgan & Rofel were
burned last night. Total loss \$162,000.

Indianapolis, Jan. 29.—Col. Norman
Eddy, Secretary of State of Indiana,
died suddenly at his residence in this
city, of heart disease.

Chicago, Jan. 30.—The Times'
Washington special says the condition
of affairs between the Government of
the United States and Venezuela is said
to be rather critical. The trouble is
the Government of Venezuela refuses to
be responsible for, or rather shows no
a disposition to observe treaty stipula-
tions. The seizure of vessels belonging
to the American Transportation Co., is
the latest question in dispute. From
information in possession of the Depart-
ment of State, it seems clear this was
an act in wilful disregard of the rights
of this company, which claims protection
from our Government. Besides, Ven-
ezuela persists in refusing to pay our
claims, which she admitted by the con-
vention of 1866.

New York, Jan. 30.—Tweed is still
in the city. He declines saying what
he will do concerning taking his seat in
the Legislature.

New York, Jan. 31.—A special from
Paris says Thiers, in discussion with
Rothschild as to the project for the
further evacuation of France by the
Germans, said: "I would like to see
the end of German Occupation, if we
had a stable Government and settled
public opinion. As it is, if the Ger-
mans were gone, we would have worse
demagogues than ever.

London, Jan. 30.—St Paul's Cath-
edral is being handsomely decorated for
thanksgiving to be held there in Febru-
ary, for the restoration of the health of
the Prince of Wales.

Washington, Jan. 30.—The President
sent the following nomination to the
Senate to-day: Samuel C. Wingard,
U. S. Attorney for Washington Terri-
tory.

A Washington dispatch says Hon. J.
R. Doolittle is in that city, and is con-
fident of the success of the new move-
ment in favor of Trumbull for the Pres-
idency.
