**News Summary.**

New York, July 8.—Josephine Mansfield took the stand, and with a face snow white, testified: I live at three hundred sixty-nine Twenty-third street. After the trial at the Yorkville Police Court I received a note from Fisk asking an interview at my house; He called there about 10:30 at night; The note is endorsed by me; Received December 10th.

The note was introduced as evidence but excluded.

Question—What did he say?  
 He said that unless I returned to him he would kill Stokes.

Question did he take out a pistol?  
 Answer—He took out a pistol at the time. It was a nice pistol, silver mounted, and had a ivory handle. He said you had better release me from this thing. I said yes, if you come out publicly and acknowledge I was right, and that the affidavits against me were frauds. He said as far as he was personally concerned he would; but there were so many persons involved that he could not do so. Then I said I must withdraw. Then he said he was taking out his revolver. I will kill Stokes and there will be blood shed before you get through. I told Stokes and advised him to be careful. On another occasion Fisk showed her affidavits which he had gotten up against the character of Eaton, and at the time admitting that they were false, and that Eaton was an honorable man. After that, being greatly excited, told her blood was to be drawn. He went out, came back at 12 very nervous, and told her Eaton had been attacked, but whether he was killed or not he could not tell. Then he was very nervous, and could not rest, though usually he was a very quiet man, and always wanted to go to sleep. [Laughter.] Miss Williams, my cousin, heard him threaten to kill Stokes.

The witness was cross-examined: Fisk had eight or ten pistols. They were accumulating, as he got presents of pistols. I knew him in November, 1837. Knew Stoke in 1869. I resided on Twenty third street for three years. He was usually tired when he came in and wanted to sleep, but ordinarily was an active man. Fisk did not call on me the day of the shooting. The first I heard of the shooting was about 5:30 or 6 P. M. A newspaper reporter came round and spoke to my cousin. I did not go down to see him about it. Fisk was a moderate drinker. I was introduced to Stokes by Henry Hardy, of the Erie Railroad, who is interested in Fisk's oil business. Fisk used to carry arms at the time of the Susquehanna and Jersey City difficulties, and at other times. I have never seen Stokes since the shooting until to-day.

Marietta A. Williams, a cousin of Miss Mansfield, was the next witness and testified to the truth of the statement in regard to Fisk threatening Stokes' life, and Stokes' testimony in regard to his threats to imprison him.

During Stokes' evidence, Miss Mansfield sat with a fan in one hand and a smelling bottle in the other, listening to the evidence.

When Stokes entered the court this afternoon he bowed and sh<sup>d</sup> returned the salutation and turning to Miss Williams remarked, "poor fellow how grey he is," she wore a large gold cross on her breast and heavy gold bracelets on her arms. She faced the jury, sitting immovably, leaning forward with her eyes fixed on the prisoner while he told his story. During the examination the Court room was packed to the doors. After recess Josie fell followed by her companion. She sailed out of the room with the air of a Grand Duchess. Her appearance excited much comment, and crowds followed her down stairs.

Two thousand sewing machine workmen resumed work at ten hours a day. The rest are expected to come in to-morrow. The metal workers' strike is ended.

Judge McCunn's funeral to day was largely attended.

H. O. Watson, brother-in-law of ex-Secretary Stanton and a soldier of the revolutionary war has been decided upon by the McHenry interest as the new President of the Erie Railroad, and will accept. He is now connected with the railway interest of Ohio, and is recommended by Vanderbilt L. B. Blackstone, of the Chicago and Alton Railroad, was offered the position but declined it.
