After starting for Fall River the steamer commenced leaking. She was run ashore at Cole Mine Wharf. A steamer has gone to take off the passengers, who are all safe.

Chicago, Aug 10—A shocking child-murder is reported at Yates, Illinois. A little nephew of a man named Hale was found buried in the yard of his uncle's house, the boy bearing

evidence of having been whipped to death. Hale has disappeared.

It is believed that the murder of young Mrs. Matthews, near Yates, Ill., has been discovered in the person of John Young. He was arrested, waived an examination, and was taken to jail. The proofs are so strong that the sheriff with difficulty rescued him from the mob who would lynch him.

Pittsburg, August 12—A meeting of workingmen, held in Allegheny to inaugurate a party in opposition to the importation of Chinese labor. Several addresses were made. This is the first of a series of meetings which will be held.
