The Senatorial Question.

Mr. Editor. In my former communication, I made the broad assertion that if J. H. Mitchell was elected United States Senator by the incoming Legislature he would be the last Republican Senator from Oregon. This assertion, although a bold one, is a most safe one and although the fact asserted pertains to the future, yet it is as indisputable as that effect will follow cause.

It is a notorious fact that Mr. Mitchell is the Boss Tweed of a clique in the Republican party in Oregon which has for the last four years in this State set up its arbitrary will as the lex suprema of the party. This clique, unlike other cliques we have had in Oregon has not dominated by virtue of its talent, ability and political strategy, but solely by the virtue of the hard dollars of a few capitalists behind the screen and who manipulated Mitchell and other members of the clique as their puppets.

Yes, in this Fellowship, as I know of my own knowledge, for having ceased for many years to take any part in politics, I can afford to confess that I was not only a member of the "dark lantern fraternity," but took an active, if not a leading part during those "dark scenes." I was initiated in Boston, Mass., in May, 1854, having gone there for that purpose from Ellsworth, Me., being at the time chief editor of the Ellsworth Herald, published by Elijah Couillard, and the first paper in Maine to espouse the K N cause.

While in Boston, when on my way to Cincinnati, I visited the "Know Nothing Headquarters," which no person could visit unless a member of the order, and while there was introduced by Ed. W. Hinks to Henry Wilson, who was at that time the Free Soil candidate for Governor of Mass. On my expressing surprise at seeing Wilson there, Hinks explained that the whole thing had been cut and dried long before; that Wilson joined the order some months previous with the understanding that it should be kept secret; that he should continue to operate outside as a free soiler, and aided by Know Nothings secure the nomination of candidate for Governor, and this had been accomplished. Hinks further stated that right on the eve of the election Wilson was to withdraw in favor of Henry J. Gardner, Know Nothing candidate for Governor, for which service [treachery to the Free Soilers?] Wilson was to be elected to the U. S. Senate, provided the Know Nothings were successful in the election.

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R-publicans who labor for principle will not debate themselves to vote with a party no longer controlled by the free votes of its members, but controlled by the arbitrary will of one man. But if as free men, they refuse to go into a slavish and already put-up caucus, but proceed untrammelled to vote for Senator, they will secure the election of some good Republican outside of the miserable clique that congregates on the back-porch of a capitalist and will thereby preserve the Republican party from the stigma of being the party of one man, and retain in its ranks the men of influence and ability who have heretofore been its great strength far beyond the use of the party wealth of any capitalist. Let the Republican members of the Legislature remember that the only safe course for them to pursue as Representatives of a great party is to debate to individuals and not be dictated by them.

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resented as saying that Marshal P. Wilder was the candidate in 1854, whereas my recollection is that Wilder was not nominated till 1853, running on the "Kangaroo Ticket," as the Bell and Everett ticket was called, because strongest on its hind legs, and this was badly defeated by the "Rail Splitters," John A. Andrews being elected Governor.

My only motive for making these statements is to set forth the facts as I remember them, for I do not care enough about politics to vote. I have hitherto remained silent because I preferred to keep clear of the abuse which is so readily heaped upon all who venture to express an opinion injurious to party policy. Instead of meeting the charge in a rational manner, and trying to disprove it, the "Oregon style" is to pile personal abuse upon the author as though proving him to be an impostor, court reporter or horse thief was a sufficient answer to his statement.

The old saying that the most inveterate liars sometimes tell the truth by mistake has been verified by the statement of the purchasable Crandall as contained in the issue of the Statesman of about ten days ago. On that occasion he had a pretty honest calculation as to the chances of Greeley being elected President, as far as he went, but when he raised color as far as one hundred and sixty-five electoral votes he came to a halt without placing in the Liberal Republican pyramid either North Carolina or California, both of which will certainly cast their votes for Greeley.
