BILLS INTRODUCED.

introduced during the present session
of the Legislature:

HOUSE.

Bill to repeal the Litigant Act.
To amend the charter of Jacksonville.

General Laws exempting certain prop-
erty from taxation.
To abolish the Grand Jury system.
To incorporate Forest Grove.
To amend the duties of State Treas-
urer and defining the fiscal year.
Providing for the construction of
the Portland, Dallas and Salt Lake
railroad.
To protect unincorporated towns.
Mr. Patton introduced a bill to
provide for the construction of a State
Capitol building.
Appropriating \$10,000 to the Fisk
River Wagon Road Company, for the
construction of a road from Tillamook
to the Willamette valley.
Authorizing a loan of \$10,000 to
build an Academy at La Grande.
Mr. Burbank introduced a bill chang-
ing the time and place of Supreme and
Circuit Courts throughout the State.
Mr. Darst introduced a bill to
amend the General Laws relative to es-
trays.
Mr. Caples introduced a bill provid-
ing for church corporations and
other corporations for charitable associa-
tions. Also a bill amending the
charter of East Portland.
Mr. Ladow introduced a bill amend-
ing the General Laws relating to
estrays.
Mr. Brown of Baker, introduced a
bill to provide a Deaf Mute Institute.
Mr. Martin introduced a bill,
amending the General laws relative to
road supervisors.
Mr. Cooper offered a bill to aid the
construction of a bridge across the
Umpqua where the stage crosses the
same, and appropriating ten thousand
therefor.

Mr. Webster, introduced S. B. No.
23, to amend Sec. 7, of the law
relating to civil and criminal proceed-
ure in Justices' Courts.
S. B. No. 30, to locate the State
University at Eugene.
S. B. No. 23, to provide for a special
election of State Printer.
S. B. No. 12, to amend section 26,
chapter 52, title 4 of the State Laws.
S. B. No. 11, to amend section 9,
chapter 53, title 5, and to repeal sec-
tion 8, chapter 2, title 1, of the
general laws of Oregon.
S. B. No. 12, substitutes for S. B. 18
to tax foreign incorporations.
Mr. Crystal introduced a Bill design-
ating the Christian University at
Monmouth as the State University.
S. B. No. 18, providing for the pay-
ment of \$1,000 per annum for travel-
ing and incidental expenses of Supreme
Judges.
S. B. No. 10, to appropriate \$25,000
out of the swamp Land Fund for the
construction of a road through Jack-
son, Grant and Baker counties, read
third time and passed. The bill names

A. Langell, E. C. Mason and J. N.
Miller, as Commissioners to superintend
the construction of said road.

S. B. No. 13, to appropriate \$10,000
of Swamp Land Fund for the con-
struction of a road from Crane Prairie,
on the Dalles Military Road in Grant
County, to the Silver City Road in
Baker County.

S. B. No. 11, to amend law relating
to assessments.

Bristow introduced S. B. No. 29, to
amend the laws preventing frauds in
elections.

Watson introduced S. B. No. 25, to
provide for the sale of tide and over-
flowed lands on the sea coast of Oregon;
also S. B. No. 27, to amend the laws
construction of the Canal and Locks at
Willamette Falls,

To define the boundaries of Grant
County.

Hannah introduced S. B. No. 30,
to amend the laws creating a Register
of State lands in Union County. The
bill provides for the election of a
Register by the Legislature in Joint
Convention.

Cornelius introduced S. B. No. 31,
designating the Pacific University at
Forest Grove as the State University.

S. B. No. 25, to provide for the sale
of tide and overflowed lands on the sea
coast of Oregon.

S. B. No. 26, to amend the law
relating to the appropriation of funds
for the construction of a steamboat
canal at Willamette Falls.

S. B. No. 28, a substitute for H. J.
R. No. 10, to appropriate \$15,000 for
mileage of the members of the Legis-
lature, read first time. Rules suspended
bill read second and third time and
passed.

Representative.

Two farmers in Hillsboro bet a set-
