The second term of La Creole Academy,
commences on Monday Nov. 11, 1872. The
Principal, Prof. Grubbs is fast gaining a well
merited popularity. There are now over
one hundred and thirty pupils in attendance,
which number bids fair to be increased to one
hundred fifty or sixty by the beginning of next
term. The Public School has been discontinued
in consequence of the public funds failing,
hence the academical term commences one
week earlier than it otherwise would. For

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE.—The most destructive
fire that ever visited our town, broke out on
Thursday morning about three o'clock, in the
butcher shop of Charles Morris adjoining the
saloon of McCann & Glaze, and soon that
building was in a perfect blaze. The fire com-
municated to the building of John Ph, im-
mediately adjoining, and went through it like so
much paper. The building of Styles
& Merriam next fell a victim to the
fiery element, and it was only by the
greatest exertions of our citizens that the fire
was prevented from destroying the whole
block. It is a great wonder to everybody
that the destruction was as little as it was, but
the hard working and earnest exertions of the
people who worked to a man indefatigably,
prevented the destruction of the entire business
portion of town. The losses foot up as follows:
John Ph, \$4,000; Styles & Merriam, \$2,600;
Judge Collins, \$300; Chas Morris, \$75; Mrs
Kennedy, \$50; Wm Clingham, \$150. We have
not been informed as to the amount of loss
sustained by McCann & Glaze, but presume that
the total loss caused by the fire will reach the
sum of \$4,000. Our people are convinced that
if we had had an organized Hook and Ladder
company with a cistern handy and accessible
that one half of the destruction could have
been prevented. We hope steps will be speed-
ily taken to have these preventatives against
future calamities.

Since the last rains the farmers are busy
getting in their fall grain.

Several enterprising young men of Dallas
met together on last Wednesday evening with
the object of effecting the permanent organiza-
tion of a young men's secret debating society,
excepting their every fourth regular meeting,
which it is intended shall be held publicly.
A committee of three was appointed to draft
a constitution and by-laws with instructions to
report the same for adoption on next Wednes-
day. The following persons were elected to
serve as temporary officers until a more per-
manent organization could be had, and a con-
stitution was adopted, Horace M. Spencer,
President, A. R. Lyle, Treasurer, E. H. Salliv-
van Secretary. We think that our young men
have made a right move in the right direction
and we hope that they will be properly sup-
ported. The young men of Dallas will have
all the opportunity they desire to display their
literary and oratorical powers. We hope they
will not permit such a chance to escape with-
out improving it to the best of their ability.

3,000; Oregon, 3,000; Delaware, 1,500;
Nevada, 2,000; Nebraska, 1,000;
Virginia, claimed; Louisiana, claimed;
Alabama, claimed.

ALL AROUND.

The Eugene Guard says a strong
current of wind passed through Spring-
field, one day last week doing consid-
erable damage.

The Dallas has a literary society.
At a meeting of the trustees of the
Agricultural College, held at Corvallis
one day last week, Joseph Lizzett was
appointed to the position of Practical
Agriculturist, to take charge of the
College Farm, and to superintend the
practical instruction of students.

The Eugene Guard says: "Last
Monday evening the incorporators of
the Union University Association held
a meeting and appointed a committee
consisting of Messrs J. M. Thompson,
J. J. Walton, Jr., W. J. S. Scott and
B. F. Dorris, to open books and
receive subscriptions for stock in said
association. To this association is
delegated the matter of procuring
suitable grounds and erecting a build-
ing for the State University, the build-
ing and grounds not to be of less
value of \$50,000. The Legislature empow-
ered our County Court to levy a tax to
raise \$20,000 of that amount, leaving
\$30,000 to be raised in stock subscrip-
tions by the Union University Associ-
ation, or by direct donation for that
purpose.

During the month of October the
Sheriff Marion County collected \$1,000
in taxes.

Prof. S. C. Simpson has opened a
course of lectures before the medical
students of the Willamette University.

The people of Roseburg celebrated
the arrival of the first passenger train
in that place by a grand ball.

Emigrants are daily passing through
Roseburg for the Croquette country.
This section is said to offer superior
inducements to settlers.

The following business was transac-
ted at the land office at Roseburg dur-
ing the month of October: Cash
sales, 2,900 acres; pre-emption filings,
4,000; A. C. S. locations, 1,280 acres;
land warrants, 120 acres; homestead
applications, 4,100 acres; final homestead
entries, 2,027 acres.

Jackson has a wonderful beet. It
is not a dead beet this time, but a veg-
etable beet which has grown into the
perfect resemblance of a man.

Andrew Rountree was killed of
Goose Lake Valley, on the 2d day in
October by a man named Smith.

The streets of St. Joe were thronged
with people on last Saturday to witness

at that place.

poured through the canvass in seven-
teen minutes on the people who atten-
ded John Wilson's Circus at Eugene

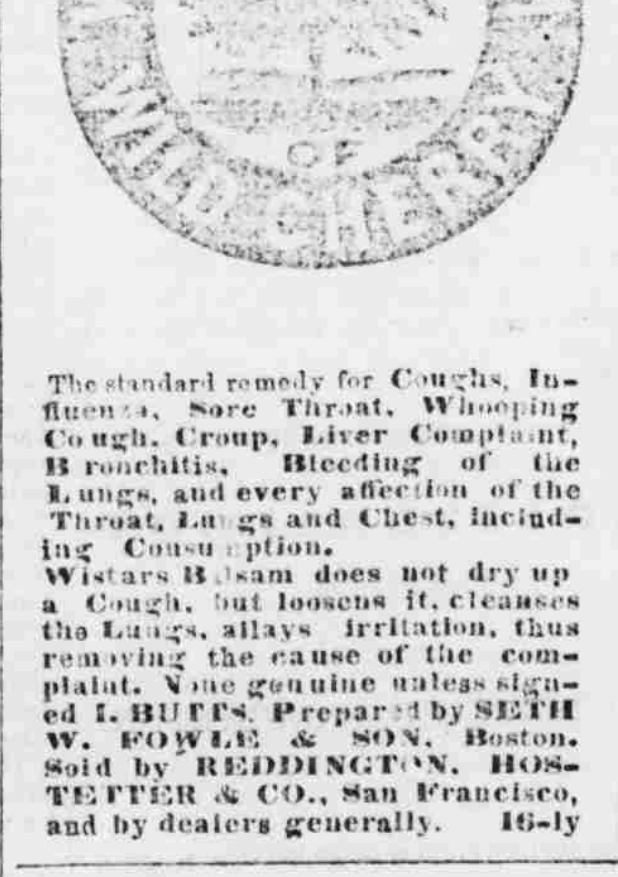

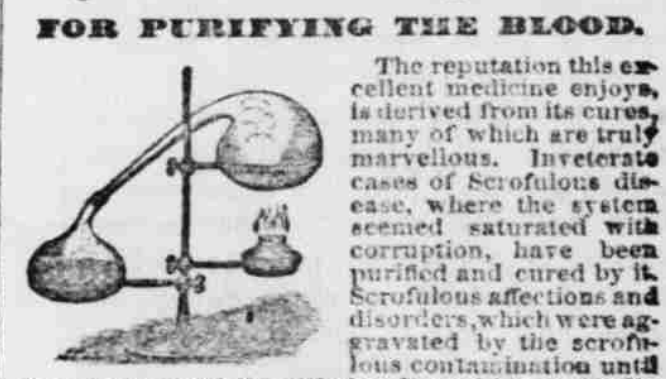
