county.

Dalles.

A man named Gay, attempted to
commit suicide in Salem one day last
week, by taking laudanum.

The Medical College of Salem is
prospering finely. The regular course
of lectures, six a day by the faculty,
are going on regularly, with a large
class in attendance.

A regular weekly paper will soon be
issued at Empire City, Coos County.

Professor Rogers, of Coos County,
has been for some time engaged in
getting up a new kind of geography,
which it is claimed will possess great
merit.

The Herald says: "We learn the
following particulars of the drawing
affair at Astoria from a passenger by
the Josie McNear: It appears that the
five men, whose names are Taylor,
Duke, John Riley, Dan Patterson and
Tom Thomas, were mill-hands em-
ployed in Cementville. During Tues-
day they had been drinking, and about
five o'clock in the evening engaged
a small sail-boat for the
purpose of going over to Astoria. Not
knowing how to manage a boat they
were cautioned against it, as the wind
was very strong and the waters rough.
They did not heed the warning, but
embarked, since which time they have
not been seen. Yesterday morning
the wreck of a boat they had
embarked in was found bottom up at
Chinook Point where it had drifted
to. As the men are still missing it is
supposed the craft upset and they
were all drowned.

Two divorces were granted in the

of Fox Bro's brick store, and was first
built and used by James Foster, Esq
in the year 1851.

ground, one wheel of the wagon running
over him. The team had not been
heard of when the cars left Hillsboro
the next day.

severe on the road between Dalles and
Canyon City as to stop the stage.

The President of the United States
has recognized John Wilson, Esq., as
Vice Consul of Her Britannic majesty
at Portland, vice J. G. Flerdew, de-
ceased. Mr. Wilson is a member of
the firm of Hewett, Wilson & Co.

A little girl was poisoned the other
day at La Grande by eating wheat that
contained sulphate of copper.

A little daughter of Mrs. Jasper,
who resides at Union, was scalded so
severely last week that in a day or two
she died.

A short time since a Mr. Patrick,
while working in Red Gulch, met with
a severe accident from the caving of a
bank, by which both bones of the
right leg were broken.

From the Sentinel: In a communi-
cation, dated Dalles, November 4, Mr.
A. Blair, Chief Engineer of the Port-
land and Salt Lake Railroad, says: "The
preliminary surveys for the road have
been completed to Oro Dell, from
which place to La Grande the route
will be determined upon after the Pres-
ident of the Company, Col. Chapman,
has made suitable arrangements for
the depot grounds. The total distance
from the Grande Ronde landing on
the Columbia river to La Grande will
not exceed one hundred and four miles,
with a maximum grade of ninety
feet per mile over the Blue Mountains),
a saving in distance, as compared with
the Union Pacific survey, of sixteen
miles, and a reduction of fifteen feet
in the maximum grade, the heaviest
grade being ninety feet to the mile.
Mr. Blair left La Grande a few days
ago for the purpose of locating the por-
tage link at the Dalles.

The Yamhill Reporter says: "We
learn of a fight which took place at a
ball given at the residence of John
Ramage, in which one Dan Conway, a
saloon keeper, snatched a pistol several
times at one Han Forest but fortunately
the Pistol missed fire. The parties
were then separated for the time, but
afterwards Conway came back, when a
further altercation ensued and Conway
stabbed Forest several times with the
knife. It is not known whether the
wounds are fatal or not. Liquor was
probably the cause."
