ENGLISH ABROAD IN POLK COUNTY.—On
yesterday morning about 1 o'clock the house

noise and supping the unknown visitor to be
one of his sons, inquired if he were sick, upon
which the burglar replied, yes, Mr. Pirau
then rose and started towards him, when the
quitting intruder unceremoniously took to
his heels. The burglar succeeded in making his
escape with a fine watch and about \$150 in
coin.

ROADS.—That portion of our public high-
way known as Nesmith's lane deserves special
attention by the authorities. A few weeks
more and it will be almost impossible to travel
that lane. It is the main road leading from
Dallas to Salem, and over which a daily mail
must travel every day in the year, Sundays
excepted. Ex Senator Nesmith is the owner
of the land on each side of the lane, and has
already expended hundreds of dollars over
and above his legitimate road tax, in gravelling
the lane; but it is too much to ask of one man
to give to the public labor enough to make a
good road the whole length of the lane, a dis-
tance of nearly two miles. The amount of
labor already performed upon this road as a
donation to the public by this enterprising
farmer, is too well understood to require com-
ment. He now offers, if the county will assist
him in part, to finish this work. He will see
that it is done. A few dollars from the county
will ensure the completion of a work of incalcul-
able value to the public. We call the special at-
tention of our County Court to this matter, and
we feel safe in saying, that if the county will
appropriate the petty sum of \$500, the Col.
will complete the whole work. Let it be done
without fail at the next term of the court.

TELEGRAPHIC.

New York, November 26.—The
Picton, supposed to have been lost in
the recent gale, has reached Cape Bos-
ton.

The steamship Baltic report that she
spoke on the 20th the ship Assyria,
from Quebec to Plymouth (England),
waterlogged, and rescued her officers
and nineteen of the crew. They were
brought to this port.

Cleveland, Nov. 25.—A fire about
midnight last night, at Sandusky, in
the engine-room of the Sandusky
Wheel company's works spread with
such rapidity that in two hours all the
company's shops, finished stock and
machinery, dwellings and a barn were
destroyed. The company saved their
warehouses and rough stock. Their
loss estimated at about \$100,000.

Matamor, Nov. 25.—The Mexican
Investigating Committee issued a notice
containing the names of all persons in
the Mexican Territory who have suf-
fered attacks upon their persons or
property since July 2, 1848, of whatever
kind, or which may have originated from
invasion or incursions of individuals
proceeding from the United States, or
individuals, at the time residing in the
Mexican Territory, but who afterwards
obtained protection in the territory of
the United States. They may present
their claims for damages so sustained,
it being the object of the Commission-
ers to form a complete judgment of
the question. It will govern its
conduct with total impartiality, being
led solely by the strictest principles of
justice. It invites all persons residing
in the United States, or owning prop-
erty therein, who may believe they
have a right to complain of robberies
and depredations committed by bands
of robbers organized in Mexico, to
present their claims to the Committee
with the necessary proofs. Residents
of Mexico are solicited to present
themselves before the Commissioners,
in order to have all necessary meas-
ures and facilities of knowing what has
occurred, so that the evils said to have
been committed on the frontiers may
be repaired and prevented in the future.
The investigation will evidently take a
wide range, as it includes all the
filibustering since the Mexican war.

New York, Nov. 26.—A Herald's
Washington special says the President
today will read to the Cabinet a com-
plete draft of his message. He has
yielded this year, as he last, to the
advice of experienced politicians and
changed its tenor so far as relates to
the south. He gives that section a
passing mention; praises the wisdom of
the infirmement law; alludes to the dis-
appearance of lawlessness in the south,
as well as good behavior at the polls in
the November election, and hopes for a
continuation of this state of affairs.
Although he has no special recom-
mendation to make on behalf of the
South, he desires that Congress shall
do whatever it deems wise in the ab-
sence of the States. Reiterating a previous
declaration, he says he has no policy to
enforce against the wish of the people.
The country is felicitated on its
accomplishments under the treaty of
Washington. Cuba is lightly passed
over, and the case of Dr. Howard
receives but brief mention. Mexico
does not receive a large share of

attention. Our relations with differ-
ent foreign nations are disposed of with
the usual brief paragraph. The
Vienna Exposition is commended, and
the Philadelphia Centennial is also
spoken of. Our credit abroad, the
efficient management of our foreign
and home policy, and the prosperity
of the nation, make up the substance
of the balance of the message.

Paris, Nov. 29.—Great excitement
over affairs at Versailles. It is an-
nounced that the members of the Right
and Right Center have determined to
support the committee appointed to
draft a reply to the message of Thiers.

New York, Nov. 26.—A special
from London says the Khedive's ex-
pedition consists of 5,000 men, command-
ed by Purdy Bey, and goes to Zanzibar
in transports, with the intention of join-
ing Dr. Livingstone and co-operating,
with him, if agreeable; otherwise, to act
independently in solving the problem of
the sources of the Nile under Egyptian
colors. It is, however, doubtful whether
the expedition is intended to join
Livingstone or meet Sir Samuel Baker,
but to open a new line of operations
into Abyssinia.
