TELEGRAPHIC.

Paris, December 15.-The sitting of
the Assembly was resumed at nine o'clock last night. Minister Dufaure addressed the House in favor of rejecting petitions for dissolution. He spoke ironically of Gambetta, whose speeches, he said were the cause of the present needless agitation. Speeches followed from members of all parties. The debate was one of the most violent and exciting which has taken place in the Assembly, and lasted until one o'clock this morning, when the chamber, by a vote of 409 to 201, rejected the petitions and passed to the order of the day. Thiers was not present during the debate, either in the afternoon or evening. Before adjourning the Assembly adopted a resolution directing that Dufaure's speech be printed in all communes of France. A similar resolution in regard to the speeches of the Radical Deputies was voted down.

The Monarchist journals are greatly
pleased with the stand taken by Dufaure. The Radical press maintain a tone of indifference and declare they will continue the agitation for dissolution.

Chicago, December 18.-A Washington
special says it is positively stated that Colfax will take charge of the New York Tribune some time next week. Arrangements have been fully consummated, and his resignation as vice President will probably be presented on the re-assembling of Congress, after the holiday recess. Colfax is very sanguine that he will be able to bring the Tribune up to its old standing. He thinks he can steer clear of the maelstrom of New York politics, into which Greeley was always being drawn.

STATE NEWS.

The Statesman says: Mr. Charles
Rhodes, the Architect, while engaged in repairing a break in the flume at the agricultural works, yesterday, met with a very painful accident. He was cutting away a portion of the broken timber when the hatchet glanced striking him on the knee, inflicting a horrible gash. He was immediately carried to a house near by, and medical aid summoned. It is feared that he will lose the use of his knee altogether.

The Eugene City Guard says: A
man named John O. Corner and a woman named Wells, who have been living together as man and wife, were arrested a few days since and lodged in jail on complaint of the husband of the latter. So soon as he had procured their arrest the husband left, and the Grand Jury were unable to find a bill against them for adultery, and one charging them with lewdness was returned. The trial has not yet taken place. There are conflicting reports as to why they came from. One says from Polk or Yamhill county, and another from Washington Territory.
