INDIANS AGAIN.—It seems that the warlike
and hostile conduct of the Indians on the
Sierra Reservation is creating great excitement
amounting almost to a general panic, among
the farmers and whites who live near the Res-
ervation. We are informed by Mr. W. D.
Lewis, who recently returned from a trip to
King's valley, that, notwithstanding the fact
that some of the State papers treat the affair
very lightly, nevertheless, the farmers in the
region are really alarmed at the hostile and
unfriendly conduct of the rookings; and on
account of the fears so entertained they have
raised a company of men for their protection,
in order that they might be prepared for any
sudden outbreak. It is a supposition with some
that the warriors simply design to escape from
the Reservation and join Capt. Jack and Scar-
face Charley. If that be true, judging from
the manner in which the war is being conducted
against the Modocs, we would think that it
would be necessary to station about ten thou-
sand men on the Reservation and 20,000 or 40,000
instantly more be ordered to the front, so
that they would be sure to intercept their
line of march. For if four hundred men are
unable to whip one hundred and fifty Indian,
there is no process of reasoning by which we
could arrive at a just conclusion as to how
many men it would be required to overcome
one thousand of braves in the event that they
should be enabled to effect a junction of their
forces.
