CONGRESSIONAL.

Washington, January 26.—It is
understood that during the recent inter-
view between the Postmaster General
and Representative Farnsworth
Chairman of the Committee on Post
Offices, the former intimated that he
would revoke his order requiring
double postage in cases where partial
postage only had been paid, provided
he should be sustained by the
Attorney General, whom he would
consult on the subject. If, however,
the Postmaster General could not do so,
the Committee will accomplish the
object by the passage of the bill hereto-
fore agreed upon.

Washington, January 24.—SENATE.—
Mr. Edmunds offered an amendment
to the appropriation bill, directing the
Secretary of the Treasury to withhold
all payments to any railroad company
on account of freight or transportation
of any kind to the amount of any
payment made by the United States for
interest upon bonds issued to any such
company and not reimbursed.

Mr. Edmunds advocated his amend-
ment. It was necessary, he said, for
the protection of the interest of the
people, and if it violated in any way
the legal rights of railroad companies
they might seek redress through a
Court of claims.

Mr. Morrill, of Maine, presented an
amendment directing the President to
take such measures as may be necessary
to recover from the Pacific Railroad
Companies the interest paid by the
United States on bonds issued for the
use of either of said roads, and con-
ferring jurisdiction on the United
States Court for the Southern District
of New York to hear and determine the
same object, subject to appeal as in
other cases.

The Senate confirmed the appoint-
ment of Davis as Assistant Secretary
of State.

HOUSE.—The House went into
Committee on the Naval Appropriation
bill, but postponed it for consideration
of the business of the District of
Columbia, a large quantity of which
was disposed of, and the House ad-
journed.

Washington, January 25.—HOUSE.—
The House, on Motion of Sargent,
President was requested to furnish
information concerning the occupation
by British Subjects of San Juan and
other islands acquired under recent
award, and whether legislation on the
subject is necessary. Sargent also
presented a minority report in the mat-
ter of Suro Tunnel, which was ordered
printed.

Washington, January 27.—The
President has not yet signed the bill
granting to the Rock Island and Pacific
Railroad one hundred thousand acres
of land in Iowa, and the general im-
pression is he will veto it. The House
of Representatives of the Iowa Legisla-
ture passed a resolution Saturday di-
recting the Governor to telegraph to
the President that it was the earnest
desire of the General Assembly that he
veto the bill. Friends of the measure
in Iowa have telegraphed to
Washington that the resolution passed
the House under a misapprehension of
facts and will not pass the Senate.

The Senate Election Committee have
commenced the examination of
witnesses in the Louisiana contested
election case.

The cotton tax-hobby was demoral-
ized to-day by the rejections by the
Dallas and Means Committee of several
bills refunding the cotton tax.

SENATE.—Mr. Stewart offered a
resolution directing the Pacific Railroad
Committee to inquire in to the relations
between the United States and the
Pacific Railroads relative to interest on
their bonds; objections being made it
was laid over and the Appropriation
bill was discussed.

A bill passed to refund the different
dues on articles of French vessels des-
tined for the United States on Nov.
5th, lost.

HOUSE.—Mr. Wilmot, of Vermont,
offered a resolution simply request-
ing the Senate to return the Goat Island
bill but the speaker ruled it out of
order during the morning hour because
it involved a suspension of the
rules.

New York, January 27th.—A Wash-
ington special says that Poland's Credit
Mobilier Committee in presenting a
report to the House will not express
an opinion of the guilt or innocence of
the parties implicated, and will base
their reason for so doing on the fact
that they were not appointed to pass
judgment, but to investigate. It is
not probable that the investigation
will be closed Tuesday.

The announcement by Senator Mor-
ton that the Caldwell investigation
must close Saturday is an indication
of an unfavorable report from the Com-
mittee. There has been no evidence
rebutting the substantive testimony
of Caldwell's partner.

We are glad to learn from our corre-
spondent at Independence, that the
farmers of Polk have taken the steps
in the right direction. Let them
meet often and forward all their pro-
ceedings and communications directly
to the REPUBLICAN, which is an inde-
pendent newspaper, devoted to the
interest of the people and war upon
their enemies, with a standing pro-
clamation, down with corrupt and hypo-
critical, political demagogues and all
monopolies injurious to the best inter-
est of the people.

The Governor has appointed John
F. Mill, Henry Klipper, and Samuel
Brown, to take charge and superintend
the building of the State Capitol.
He has also appointed Syl C. Simpson
superintendent of public instructions,
and L. Lane a Code commissioner in
place of Simpson, resigned. No selec-
tion could have been made, with which
the people would have been better sat-
isfied.

The Bulletin quotes approvingly an
article from the National Republican,
which speaks of Mrs. Attorney Genera
Williams as the delightful and charm-
ing lady of that city. She is not
spoken of in Oregon as particularly
delightful or charming.

The snow is eighteen inches deep on
the level in Utah.

The Bulletin has washed its hands
of the Commercial Reporter of that
city, and still they are dirty.
