STATE NEWS.

The new paper at Empire City will
be called the Coos Bay News and the
first number will probably be issued on
Thursday of this week. A Mr. Zigler,
from San Francisco, we are informed,
will drive the quill-Oregonian.

The mail route commencing at
Jacksonville and running to Browns-
borough, thence to Big Butte, thence to
Hannah's Ferry, from thence to
Meadows on Evens' Creek, from the
Meadows to Hays' Store in Sam's
Valley, and from there to Jacksonville
via Bybee's Ferry and Manzanita has
been established.

At a meeting of the Town Board of
Jacksonville on the 4th, the Recorder
presented the annual statement of re-
ceipts and expenditures of the town or
the year ending February 8th,
1873, which shows balance over from
previous year of \$559.84; receipts from
all resources, \$1,128; total expendi-
tures, \$1,025.88; balance on hand
including unpaid warrants to the
amount \$5,865.95.

Roseburg rejoices over the erection
of a city jail.

Coyotes and the honest watch dog
are doing considerable damage to the
sheep in Douglas county.

The following business was transac-
ted at the Roseburg Land Office during
the month of February: Commuted
homesteads, 169 acres; cash sales, 635
acres; homestead entries, 2,538 acres;
A. C. N. homesteads, 1,120 acres; dan-
tion certificates, 3,614 acres; 38 pre-
emption filings; Coos Bay Wagon Road
Company's lands, 29,722 acres; State
University lands, 390 acres. Total,
38,800 acres.

We take the following items from
the Bulletin:

A correspondent from Ochoco valley
says that during the month of February
there were but four pleasant days in
the valley, the remainder being rainy,
and disagreeable. Very few cattle
have died this winter, though they are
not now in as good condition as two
months ago. Only one hundred head
cattle could now be found in that vic-
inity, and sales are lifeless. Old set-
tlers say they never experienced a more
rainy season in the valley.

Coosbay is just beginning to attract
attention of capitalists from abroad.
The new coal mining companies are
about to enter into extensive operations
building railroads, etc. Mills are being
erected, and the vicinity is rapidly
filling up with an industrious popula-
tion.

Ichabod Henkle's saw mill, on the
south fork of Mary's River, twelve
miles from Corvallis, was burned a
few days ago. A fire was left burning
on a block, and when the owner re-
turned the glory of Ichabod's mill had
departed.

We take the following items from
the Statesman:

A meeting is to be held at Portland
next Saturday evening to make up a
party of emigrants for Columbia, South
America.

The stockholders of the Union Uni-
versity Association will meet at Eugene
on the 20th inst, to elect three directors
of the State University.

The Linn County Farmers held their
first meeting at the Court House Sat-
urday, which was attended by dele-
gates from all portions of the county.
A club was organized, many speeches
made, resolutions passed, etc. They
resolved to build warehouses at Al-
bany and Astoria, to handle and ship
their own grain, and pay no more trib-
ute to middlemen, or any other man.
Subscription books were opened, and
small amounts subscribed. In point
of numbers the meeting was a success.

The honest farmers of Benton county
according to a local paper, have organ-
ized themselves into a club, for the
purpose of protecting their rights from
the extortions of a ring of merciless
speculators, having their head in Port-
land and their tail-no one knows
where.

LATEST FROM THE MODOC WAR.

Yreka, March 12.-Elijah Steele
arrived from the front this evening.
Judge Rosborough will be in to mor-
row. Mr. Steele thinks that the
Modocs wanted to come in as they
agreed to, but were frightened from
doing so by stories told them by those
interested in having them remain
in the country. He says there is a
strong rivalry between Jack and Scam-
chin for the leadership. He thinks
there can be no settlement of the
of the difficulties without fighting, and
there is no chance for Jack's having
left his stronghold, as there is too
much snow on the mountain ranges they
would have to cross. The troops are
all in fine condition and fully prepared
for a forward movement. General
Gillem would advance to-day and close
in around Jack's cave. The military
have maps of the lava bed, showing
every hole, cave and crevice in it, and
they can undoubtedly capture him now
without much loss of life. Jack's
present position is destitute of water,
except as they get it from Tale Lake.
They have large quantities of ice stored
in the caves, which will last them for
a time. Their living consists of beef
and roots. They have not as many
arms as has been represented. The
weather was very cold and stormy.

The following is from the Journal

extra of this afternoon:
Fairchild's ranch, March 11.-The
Indians had not come in when the
courier left. General Gillem has
ordered an attack, and the soldiers are
now in the Lava Bed, following Captain
Jack. Hooka Jim sent in word to
Ivan Applegate by Modoc Sally
that he wanted him to make a "skoo-
kum paper" to lay before the Peace
Commission, to allow him to return
to Yainax Reservation. Applegate says
he will make a strong paper for this
murderer of settlers-to be allowed the
privilege of going to the Happy
Hunting Ground Reservation, as he
don't want any of his kind mixed up
with decent Indians at Yainax.

Jacksonville March 7.-An Alterca-
tion took place this afternoon in front
of White & Mason's store, between
Horace L. Ish and Jas. D. Fay, in
which Ish was shot in the left side of
the face the ball passing downward and
lodging in the neck. The wound,
although dangerous, is not likely to be
mortal. Fay was not injured.
