STATE NEWS.

The Statesman says:
 It is estimated that the Oregon wool crop of this year will be worth one million of dollars.

The steamers Shoo Fly, Albany, Dayton and Fanny Patten are laid up in the Basin at Oregon City.

The stock books of the Willamette Bridge Co., at Portland, are now open the shares are \$100 each.

The fisheries along the Columbia river have enlarged their capacities for the canning business of 1873.

Mr. Fullerton has taken possession of the land office at Roseburg, vice B. Herman, superseded.

Judge Lorenzo Sawyer will hold a term of the U. S. Circuit Court, commencing at Portland next Monday.

During January, February, March and April, forty six marriage licenses were issued by the Clerk of Multnomah county.

During the present year, \$25,000 will be expended on the principle road through Umpqua valley, between Wilber and Canyonville.

The annual election of officers of the Jackson county Agricultural Society will occur at the Court House, Jacksonville, on Saturday, May 10.

A. G. Walling Joseph Butcher, Chas. W. Parish and A. N. Gambel are Representatives from Hasler's Lodge Portland, to the Grand Lodge, Odd Fellows, of Oregon.

Large numbers of cattle are sent from the Dalles to Puget Sound. The trip is made in thirty-six hours, when the same journey one year ago would occupy five or six days.

Work progresses favorably on the reconstructed Woolen Mills at Oregon City. The masons have commenced on the third story. Some 25 carpenters and masons are employed, the whole being under the supervision of Mr. John Olerkirk. The frame work of the picking house is up and ready to roof and close in.
