We owe it to ourselves, to our posterity and to our country, to make the chief industry of the world the most honorable in the eyes of mankind, and, to this end, self denial may have to be exercised: It may be necessary to forego some of the emoluments in order to bring into play the latent powers of the mind, for it is mind, or the exercise of the intellect, which moves the world.

While I would not disparage in the least the best culture the schools can give, it will not do to wait for a generation of learned farmers to come on the stage. The education we need and must have to redeem our calling from reproach is that which will give us more skill to adapt means to the end sought.

Terrible Accident a Number of Persons Drowned in Rock River.

Dixon, Ill. May 4.—A terrible accident involving a fearful loss of life, occurred here this afternoon, while the rite of baptism was being administered to a number of recent converts to the Baptist churches here, at a point in Rock River just below the trestle iron bridge. About 200 persons, including many ladies and a number of children had gathered on the bridge to witness the ceremony, when suddenly the bridge gave way and precipitated its living freight into the stream below. The scene which ensued was indelibly terrible, as the struggling victims endeavored to free themselves from the ruins of the bridge, and from each other. Large crowds on the banks rushed wildly to and fro, many of them so distracted with terror as to be unable to render any assistance; others more self possessed, speedily brought ropes, planks and boats, and went nobly to work. Some of those who were on the bridge when it fell were so near the ends that they were able to reach the bank with out assistance, while others were fortunately within reach of those on shore. Up to 6 P. M. thirty-two bodies had been taken in. It is almost certain that there are others still under the wreck of the bridge. Twenty four were rescued alive, but more or less injured—some fatally.

MIDNIGHT—Up to this hour no other bodies have been recovered at this point, but several are reported picked up at Sterling, six miles below—and doubtless the swift current has borne others even further down the river. The general estimate of the number lost is from 90 to 100. It was stated in previous dispatches that thirty-two bodies were recovered before dark, and five other bodies floated down past those engaged at the wreck, and have not yet been recovered. There are supposed to be at least fifty bodies still unaccounted for; most of them, it is thought, are under the wreck of the bridge.
