The merchants of Dallas seem to be unusually busy at present notwithstanding the hard times and especially on the corner at Lee's where the people seem to be attracted to examine and purchase the new goods which have arrived and sold very cheap for cash.

Court will continue in session next week. Business is so fast increasing in this district that Judge Boham is employed most of his time either at regular terms, or hearing chancery cases at chambers.

STRAYED.—A horse belonging to SW Smith got loose from the place where it was hitched at the Court House Yard, or was turned loose by some one for mischief. Wednesday night, and strayed away and was not found until the next evening some two miles away, when it was found and returned to the owner, but the saddle was gone. Any information in relation to the saddle will be thankfully received and liberally rewarded when given at this office. The horse was found about two miles north of town.

CIRCUIT COURT. In the action brought against A. H. Whitley, for \$20,000 damages for assaulting Glaze, a charge of venue was denied and the case set down for trial at this term. The case of the State vs Dice for shooting at the time William Whitley was killed, was tried, and the jury rendered a verdict of not guilty. Fred Waymire was tried for assault with a dangerous weapon and convicted. The case of Lewis vs Lewis which has been twice to the supreme court was tried and judgment rendered for plaintiff. An unusual amount of interest has been manifested during this term and still continues. The Court House most of the time is full, and in one instance we noticed the presence of ladies. Quite a number of indictments have been found during the term but the Grand Jury has now concluded its business and rose.

A letter from Jefferson to the Statesman says: The country heretofore is in a high state of excitement over the mysterious disappearance of Riley Tharp. This is now the tenth day since he was last seen, and the only thing developed yet in the search for the missing man, is the discovery of a horse he was riding on an Island about two hundred yards below a ford in the Santiam river. The general supposition is that he met his death in attempting to ford the river at the point indicated. He resides near Scio, and was on his way home after an absence of several days. He leaves a wife and ten dependent children, having been married twice and the last time to a widow with small children; their sorrow is great. The people of the Santiam are out in force and daily search is made for some clue that may lead to the discovery of his fate.

Three persons were fined in the Circuit Court, Douglas county, last week, for violations of the Sunday law. William Reynolds, a painter, is missing from McMinnville.
