MEASLES.—The Town is full of measles running rampant, Mr. J. A. Applewhite prostrate and unable to be in the court room to attend to business, and many others in town are afflicted with this sickness.

FRUIT.—This year will be a prolific one for fruit of all kinds. The crops for the last three years had led many to believe that the orchards were failing; but this crop will undeceive them in that opinion, nearly every orchard is loaded. The caterpillars have all mysteriously disappeared in one case of this year's crop.

PERSONAL.—Richard Williams of Portland is still here in attendance upon the Court, and will probably remain some days yet. Col. Kelsey of Corvallis and George R. Helm of Albany, McCain of Lafayette, are also here and all have plenty to do. E. P. Stone of Salem and our enterprising and gentlemanly District Attorney Humphrey are still here and at work.

BUY.—Our county officers are on the jump. The Sheriff returned at eight o'clock last evening after being absent all day, with a special venire for fifteen new jurors, the end of the term is not yet in sight, and on the subject of taxes for Polk County for the next year we hold our breath.

GRASSHOPPERS.—There is a fear among some that this valley will be afflicted with these pests this year, as such an unusual and remarkable quantity of small ones are to be seen. This valley has heretofore been very much favored in being free from their visitation while at several different times Eastern and Southern Oregon have been overrun by them. It is to be hoped that they are not in such numbers as to injure the grass and crops.

COURT.—Court is still in session with but little prospect of closing soon. Quite a number of important cases have been tried during the last week, and the case of Glaze vs Whitley claiming five thousand dollars damages for false imprisonment which grew out of the Glaze whittier shooting affair is now on trial, and another suit between the same parties for twenty thousand dollars damages for an assault by shooting at plaintiff at the same time, will come on next. In the case of the State vs Whitley, for kidnapping Sutton to kill Glaze, the Court has sustained the demurrer for the reason that the indictment did not state any crime known to the statute or common law.

LAWYER.—Whitley, Glaze trial is over and verdict for plaintiff for \$86,666.

ACCIDENT.—Mr. E. H. Sullivan formerly foreman of the REPUBLICAN, who is teaching school near Grand Round, while on his way to the school house in company with the children of Capt. Lafollette in a hack, met with a severe accident. As we learn it so far, he was driving the horses and while going down hill, some portion of the harness gave way, the hack ran on to the horses which caused them to jump suddenly, when one horse broke, and he driver holding on to the other, the horses were turned short around, the harness turned over, the children and teacher were thrown out upon the rocks severely injuring two of the Captains children and the teacher. We have not yet learned the extent of the injuries. The Captain was here at the time, and a messenger was dispatched for him in a great hurry; so that the messenger himself did not know the extent of the injury. We hope for the best.

OUR RAILROAD.

Col. Chapman, the pioneer war horse of the Portland and Salt Lake Railroad, spent wednesday in La Grande, being on his way home. From him we get the joyful intelligence that our railroad is a SURE THING. On the first of July work will be commenced on the portages of the Columbia river; contracts for the construction of boats will be let immediately. Late this Fall or early next Spring the embargo laid on commerce of Eastern Oregon by the monopoly which now holds the Columbia river will be removed and the best section of Oregon will be FREE. These are no idle notions, but facts, stern facts, which could now be and soon will be demonstrated. Let no paid organ or men employed by N. P. R. R. decry this enterprise longer. In three years (that is not long to wait) our road will be in full operation. You can then ship your produce, or Lumber East or West, and we all will be happy to see it.
