Circuit Court.—Our Circuit Court is last over, and the town gait on its usual quiet, a large number of cases were tried and a verdict was over to the next term. The cases that created the most interest, were those, civil and criminal, of Gize and Whitley. There was one criminal case only tried during the term growing out of the shooting affair, and that was the case of Frank Dice who was said to be Whitley's accomplice, and he was acquitted. There was two heavy damage suits brought against Whitley growing of the same transaction, one of which was tried and out of \$5000. claimant, recovery of \$855, was had, and that judgment has gone to the Supreme Court for reversal. The other damage suit went over to the fall term, and the first case on the criminal side was transferred to Salem. Another series of cases were commenced against Whitley upon the story of one Charles Sutton, who is recently out of the Penitentiary, and one indictment found which the court discharged for the reason that all the facts stated if true constituted no crime whatever.
