TELEGRAPHIC.

Nashville, June 24.—Twenty-nine deaths occurred from cholera to-day (Friday) were whites. The people are much more hopeful, and business is improving.

New York, June 24.—The Pacific Mail Steamship Company Directors held a meeting to-day. No positive action was taken. They will meet again Thursday next.

The Board of Health here adopted measures to put the city in a thoroughly good sanitary condition.

Washington, June 24.—The Comptroller of Currency has declared the second dividend in favor of the creditors of the First National Bank of Nevada, at Austin, making 65 per cent dividend.

New York, June 24.—The express train from the West ran into a freight train a mile west of the city, demolishing several freight cars and the engine of the passenger train. One man killed and several injured.

Boston, June 24.—Domestic wool continues in good demand, manufacturers taking all lots offering. The market is in good condition owing to the high prices it commands.

Havana, June 25.—In the late fight near Puerto-Principe, where Major Romario was killed, there were 90 Spanish troops engaged. Only 15 returned, the rest being killed by the Insurgents.

The yellow fever continues with unabated violence, and a very large percentage of the cases prove fatal.

Panama, June 16.—Advices from Guatemala state that the country has been placed in a state of siege, to be continued until the rebellion in the Eastern Department is put down.

Rapid progress is making in rebuilding San Salvador. Many families who had left the city have returned and are erecting improved dwellings.

London, June 24.—A special published here reports that General Nouvelles, Commander-in-Chief of the Spanish army in the North, and eleven companies of his command, have been captured by Carlists near Pampluna.

London, June 26.—The Great Eastern reports, noon, yesterday, in longitude 43° 14', 1,873 miles of cable played out. All well.
