STATE ITEMS.

From the Statesman:
The body of a colored lad named
George Williams who was drowned at
Salem last winter, was found in a pile
of drift wood on last Monday.

A colored barber named Samuel
Johnson was found dead in the rear
of his shop at Salem on last Monday
morning. The verdict of the Coroner's
jury was that he died from the rupture
of a blood vessel. He had been drink-
ing excessively the day before.

The Oregonian says the rash of men
from the Dalles to the Okechoc mines
has left the town without the necessary
supply of mechanics and laborers to carry
on the improvements in progress.

From the Bulletin: Portland has
several greyhound "congers," for we
notice several of this tribe of dogs in
the city now, and nearly all are recent
importations.

The city is extending to the South
very rapidly, for where there was only
an isolated house two years ago, there
is now quite a large number.

The little boy of Mr. Ladd, injured

all right again.

Northern trip 460 tons of freight, prin-
cipally assorted merchandise.

the General's life.

The Spirit of the Times: The

Minister to Russia, had an insurance
policy for \$2,500 dollars in the South-

lington, and still another for \$10,000
in the St. Louis Mutual, aggregating
the sum of \$17,500.

St. Louis, June 24.—An attempt
was made on Saturday last by a band
of desperadoes to rob the store of Wm.
Roddy at Burlington. Roddy resisted,
and shot and killed two of the gang
named Backus and Jefferson, and
clubbed another with his gun so badly
that he cannot live.

Concord, N. H., June 24.—In the
House to-day a Special Committee on
the subject of giving to women the
privilege of voting in School Dis-
tricts reported in favor of giving them
"the right." A resolution to adjourn on
Saturday was adopted.
