

The statement is made that the Secretary of the Treasury has authorized a reward of \$1,000 for the capture of Gen. Harper, the defaulting Collector of Internal Revenue in the Springfield district. The newspapers of the State have indulged in various suggestions as to the cause of the default, the amount of which is variously estimated at from \$100,000 to \$300,000. By some it is attributed to speculation in grain in Chicago, by others to the sale of distillers' stamps on credit, and to a general system of indulgence to tax-payers. Others, again, deny all these suggestions. We suggest as a means of throwing some light on this subject, that Gen. Harper contributed very heavily to the expenses of the last Presidential election in this State, and it is possible that he have made expenditures for the Cause which he expected the party good to him, and which the party has failed to do. Once in arrears, the temptation to try to make good the deficiency by extra official operations is one that is not generally resisted in such cases. It is not likely that this large sum was lost at one time; the use of the public money must have begun some time, and, during the excitement of a political campaign, a man of Gen. Harper's liberal and confiding disposition would be more likely to fall into the practice than at any other. It is possible, judging from previous defaultations, that a portion of the money was loaned to politicians, who have failed to return it. Gen. Harper was a man of good personal habits, and there is no probability that he has a cent of the money in his possession. It is to be hoped, however, that he may be captured, and not immediately pardoned.—Chicago Tribune.
