THE WHITLEY TRAGEDY.

We have been requested to publish the testimony taken in the case before the coroners Jury, but the officers of the law in whose custody they are, think it bad policy to publish the same, and therefore refuse to surrender the written evidence for publication. We have no desire to color the matter either way, but do desire that the facts shall be stated to the public, and we are aware that, it will be expected that the REPUBLICAN will give the particulars as it is the local paper and is supposed to know better concerning the facts than any other. We stated last week the plain facts in the matter as we understood them from eye witnesses. What more could we do? It is not right for us to act from prejudice or to guess at what occurred, or even to accept the exaggerated statements of warm partisans. We desire the public should be informed of the facts only, and so far as we learn them the people shall have them without color. There has been many things hastily published in some of the State papers which had no foundation in fact. The statement in the Bulletin that, Whitley came to town on the day of his death bringing with him a gang of men, is incorrect, Whitley as we said before was here alone and on business, and the statement that he on that day quarreled with Mr. T. H. Glaze is also incorrect, we do not think that Whitley and Glaze who shot him, had had any conversation with each other for the last twelve months. Mr. Glaze assigns his own reason for the act, which is the old feud existing between them for a long time, as we understand from his friends. Whether Glaze committed the act in self defense, or whether there was any good cause for the killing at the time, are the questions in which the public are interested, and the friends of Whitley, so far as we know, desire nothing except that the facts should be thoroughly investigated, the law vindicated and justice done and this far, they intend bravely to go. Mr. Glaze and his friends ought not to object to this and so far as we know they do not. The public demand that no more blood shall be shed, but that the rights of persons shall be protected by law. We hope there will be no disposition on either side to settle matters by combat, for by that mode there is no end. We hope never to be called upon to chronicle another bloody tragedy in Dallas and in this case we have to say, let the whole matter be openly and fairly investigated, without prejudice or intrigue, and if Mr. Glaze is innocent let that be known, if he is guilty let him be punished according to the crime he has committed.
