STATE ITEMS.

The editor of the Bedrock Democrat at Baker City, would like to know the whereabouts of Alex Blakely a printer.

The first wheat shipment of wheat by railroad, Walla Walla and Wallula railroad took place Tuesday Oct 14th—twenty-four tons from Cumming's Station, to Wallula. The length of the trip was nine miles and it was made in little over an hour. The people of Walla Walla valley think the affair a big thing and, of course, the beginning of a "new era."

The Walla Walla Union of the 18th of Oct. mentions the arrival of a number of emigrants who have crossed the plains the past season in the good old fashioned way—with ox teams. They came from Illinois, Kansas and Indiana.

The Albany Brass band went out serenading the other evening, and all came home—happy.

A Post Office has been established as Little Elk, Benton County, with Mr. E. H. Baker as Postmaster.

The Chinese in Astoria have become somewhat heightened, having purchased and equipped a sloop for their own private use.

A jockey club has been formed in Grande Ronde Valley, and on the 11th, 12th, 13th of November the Fall races will come off.

A pawn broker's shop has been opened at Salem, and b'boys are only awaiting the owner thereof to secure the license to give him a call and greet him as "uncle."

Dr. Dawne informs the Statesman of the flourishing condition of the Agricultural College at Corvallis. There are between two hundred and seventy five and three hundred students there at the present time. The prospects of the College were never better.

The Statesman complains of dangerous pitfalls for foot passengers, caused by excavations made for the reception of gas and water pipes. But what are these compared to the pitfalls in that city during State Fair week.

The Jacksonville Sentinel man thinks he has a dead thing on "wood thieves." He has no wood to steal.

The Fall term of the Circuit Court for Josephine county, Judge Prim presiding, convened at Kirbyville last Monday.

An elopement from the classic regions of Champoez, in Marion county, is related in the Statesman. The parties were a Miss Hunt and a Mr. Riley. They were hotly pursued, and are now luxuriating in hymenial bowers.

Immigration to the Goose Lake country has not been near so large as had been anticipated, the war having deterred many from going there who had written to their friends last Fall that they intended to come this season. There is nothing now in that whole region to cause alarm.

The Statesman of the 24th says: It is astonishing to see the amount of business that is being done at these mills at the present time; wheat is rolling in and flour rolling out by hundreds of tons every week. Mr. Kinney told us yesterday that they are turning out four hundred and fifty barrels, or forty five ton of flour daily. During the present week, and previous to yesterday, they shipped four thousand barrels, or four hundred tons of flour to Portland, when it will be re-shipped, per steamer Ajax to San Francisco. They are now making up a cargo for England, which will be shipped as soon as it can be ground. We were also told by Mr. Kinney that the Company have just put in one new stone at the mill, and have another nearly ready, which will be in use in a few days. They will also have a chop stone running in about a week and when in full blast they expect to turn out 500 barrels of flower per day with ease.
