Washington, Nov. 12.—A correspondent referring to the Cabinet meeting yesterday, makes President Grant say that he had read that 80 Cuban insurgents, captured as prisoners of war, had been shot on the field, and that while the report lacked confirmation, he was prepared to hear its confirmation, after what had already occurred in Cuba. If the Spanish people in their efforts to establish a Republican form of Government could not control their authorities in Cuba, then in the interests of humanity he thought it time to interfere, not to encourage struggling Cubans nor to embarrass the Spanish Republic in any way, but wholly in the interest of civilization and humanity.
