GREAT FIRE AT JACKSONVILLE

Jacksonville, April 14 .- A fire broke

out in this town this morning at about 4 o'clock. It originated near the southeast corner of Oregon and Califor dings, and soon got beyond control Although no wind was blowing, the dry lumber blazed so high and the flames spread so rapidly that nothing could be done to check the confl gration till it had spread across to house of like character on the north side of the street. Part of two blocks, embrae ing some brick buildings, are consumed all business houses and the heart o the town The following is a list o the losers and the amount of losses as far as can now be obtained: Walter's saloon, fixtures, personal effects, \$2,000 Kreutzer's bakery and stock, \$1,500 E. MURDER AT CHAMPOEG

BASE BALL-The young men of Dallas will Saturday last, by Thomas Garrand, & half-breed. The particulars of the bloody affair, as they come to us are very meager. It seems the parties had a dispute on the road a short distance from Champoeg, concerning a sum of money which, as Gerrand claimed Hubbard owed for wood. Hubbard declined to pay the amount, some words passed, and they separated, Gerrand good notion to shoot you. Afterwards, Hubbard went into a store to Champoeg whither Gerrand followed him. As the latter entered the doorway, Hubbard said to those standing near him; "here's a man who says he's going to shoot me" To him Gerrand replied; "I believe I will do it," and Hubbard said : "All right! blaze away!" The words had scarcely been uttered before Gerrand drew his pistol and fired, the shot taking effect in Hubbard's neck, enteron the left side and ranging downwards lodging in the right shoulder. A surgeon was called and the ball was extrac ted. It is believed that Hubbard can not long survive. In the community where he had so long resided, he has enjoyed a reputation for good behavior and peaceable disposition.

Immediately on firing the fatal shot Gerrand fled. He is now a fugutive from justice, although it is by no means probable that he can long elude the officers who are on his track. The constable of Champoeg offers a reward of \$50 for the apprehension of Ger-
