Hon. L. T. Barin.

A well known and highly-esteemed resident of Clackamas; is an active, energetic citizen and a gentleman that takes a lively interest in the welfare and prosperity of our fair young State, of which he has been a resident for over a score of years. He was born in Providence, Rhode Island, in 1842, and came to Oregon when he was twenty years of age and settled in Oregon City, where he took up a piece of government land and for the first few years interested himself in improving it. He enlisted in Co. E of the First Regiment Oregon Cavalry, and was elected First Sergeant, which position he held for three years, receiving an honorable discharge at the end of his term of service. Returning to Oregon City he commenced the study of law in 1869, in the office of Johnson & McCown, and was admitted to the bar in 1872, and in the same year was elected a member of the House of Representatives from that county. His wedding took place during the session, the bride being Miss Josephine H. Harding of Oregon City. He was elected City Prosecuting Attorney in 1874, and was re-elected in 1875. During the years 1877 and 1878 he was Mayor of Falls City, and was considered an efficient officer. He received the appointment of Register of the United States Land Office in January, 1878, under President Hayes, and was re-appointed by President Arthur in February, 1882. He is of the average build, rather heavy set, and an active politician. He prides himself on being an uncompromising Republican, and has stood by his political principles in times and places that try men's hearts. He is still in the prime of life and has a bright future before him.—Pen Pictures.
