GLENDY, THE MUCKLE PET  
Chokes his Wife.

It may be well now as the mist has gone to the dogs to explain to the people the causes that originated this infamous sheet. When the St. Helen mill went into bankruptcy, a number of years ago, the Muckles came here from Salmon Creek where they were logging and bought the mill. Frogmore, our home joins the townsite on one side and Milton on the other. It is the last place on the Lower Willamette River, and has a water front a mile long from Milton Creek nearly to Muckles' mill. At most 6 years ago the Muckles got hold of a lot of timber land on the head waters on Milton creek, then without permission they employed Dean Blanchard with his pile-driver to drive piles for a boom up and down the whole front of Frogmore. They cut a trail on Frogmore Neck, slashing down what trees they chose. They ran their logs all over our lowlands tearing down our fences whenever in the way of their logs. Our fence cost us \$600 in gold, and was regular fencing material bought of the Ladds when they owned the mill. They afflicted with Dean Blanchard, who was born down in Aroostook with one leg hanging over in New Brunswick, and calculated by his assistance to run the county politically and financially and crowd out, freeze out and persecute everybody that should oppose their greed. They were Democrats, but the old man came from Canada, and having some education, told them the Republican party was in power; they did not read the papers, because they could not. What money should have educated them the old man had poured down his throat in bad whiskey. They knew Major Adams was a sound Republican, but that didn't make any difference, they wanted the land he occupied and made their brags they would get it. They intended to freeze him out. His place yielded him no support because his fences were torn down; they never offered him a board or a nail, but told all the mean things they could think of, to injure his credit, and prevent him from getting a living and supporting his family. One winter he was sick with a fever, and could not leave his bed, and they started to Salem to get his lowland as tide-lands. The "Tide-land" was a little strip on the beach, and they knew if they got it it would be by perjury, or else they were so ignorant they knew no better. Perhaps they thought the United States was like England or Canada where the rich oppress the poor, and drive them out when they want their property.

Of course those County officials on whose bonds they went, talked and acted in their favor as much as they dared, and some of their hired retainers had to plaster their actions or be discharged. They did not succeed at Salem and so winter before last tried again. Meanwhile we had bought the COLUMBIAN, and had a club to defend ourselves, but they had made thousands of dollars out of the use of Frogmore, and as we had kept so far from, they interpreted our silence into cowardice, and thought they would move all along the line. Our children were down sick with the measles and pneumonia, and they sent out Caudle to survey the land. Jim Muckle came out the same day and inquired after our children's health. The application was now made in due form, *scorn to and ready to be finished*; we dropped on their actions, went to Salem, and before the board of Tide-land Commissioners they were totally routed. Governor Thayer, Senator Dolph and others said the land was specially exempted from Tide land, but still some of the county officials, on whose bonds they are, tell ignorant people the Muckles have a right on the land, and plaster over their meanness and oppression because from self interest they think they have to. This explains why last election we fought the Muckles in the Republican party. We voted Rep. State, Congressional, and part of the Co. ticket for those whom we thought would not be influenced corruptly by the Muckles. And we think we did right; when any man is introduced to be a tool of any clique or set of oppressors we deem it the right of every true American citizen to rebel. This is the only way to preserve our liberty. Election passed away and the Muckles got into office by reduced majorities some of their friends, and they thought we were squelched but we didn't die, we were not that kind of a man, we kept on our way growing in spite of their slanders, their lies and annoyances. We had opened the eyes of community and they were watched with jealousy. At last they

determined to buy a printing press, and publicly and privately said they would freeze us out; even children reiterated their remarks. They christened it the mist. They found a willing tool in Wm. Glendye, the wife-beater. He was a man who had always been a Democrat; he had run on the Democratic ticket in Columbia County; but was too mean a pill for that party to swallow and was defeated when they were in the ascendancy.

The Muckles have made a gigantic effort to get away the official patronage, and last week Mr. Glendye came out with a pronunciamento respecting Cowlitz County as well as Columbia County. The Muckles were moving on us all a long line again. Last Saturday eve the mist sunk into a depth of infamy which forbids resurrection. It shows just what the Muckles are. They have had rope enough, and hung themselves. We had depicted the character of their pet. Those were slanders they said, but last Saturday it was proved what we had said of Glendye was true. The press of the mist had been moved into the new house the Muckles had built for it. It was set up in the front room. Just at sunset a most agonizing shriek was heard from the rear of Glendye's house. Mr. McNelly who stops at Mr. B. F. Giltner's, went for his hat, jumped over the back fence just in time to see Mrs. Glendye rushing through the back door of the house to escape the hands of her brute husband William Glendye, the Muckle pet. She was shrieking and sobbing in the most heart-rending manner; her throat was black and blue where she had been choked and strangled. Mr. McNelly could not say a word. Byron Caples arrived on the scene of action a moment before, having torn a big slit in the knee of his pantaloons he went in such a hurry. He heard her shriek out, "He tried to choke me to death." Mr. McNelly entered the house, and found the furniture upset, as if a fierce battle had been fought, and a desperate struggle had been undergone. She spent the night with her sister Amanda at Judge Moore's residence. The next day her father, Hon. George Merrill came and took his injured daughter to the paternal home where she had been raised one of the most beautiful and amiable young ladies of Oregon. Her sister, Mrs. T. A. McBride said the marks of Glendye's cruel hands were still visible on her sister's throat the next morning. He shook and choked her. Wonder whether that was one of his "official" acts, and is "endorsed" (as he says) by officials. We would say that Judge Moore has never, that we know of, taken part against us, nor do we believe Judge Beall of Cowlitz Co. has, for he was one of our best friends in days long gone when he defended us "vi et armis" against those who tried to assassinate us in those fierce political campaigns of Washington Territory. There is a feeling abroad in the community that calls for a coat of tar and feathers for Glendye the Muckle pet. How proud the god-fathers and godmothers of the mist must feel!
