The highest range of mountains in the Himalayas, the mean elevation being estimated at from 15,000 to 18,000 feet.

The loftiest mountain is Mount Everest or Gaurisankar, of the Himalaya range, having an elevation of 29,000 feet above the sea level.

The largest theater is the new Opera House in Paris. It covers nearly three acres of ground. Its entire mass is 4,287,000 feet. It cost about 100,000,000 francs.

The largest suspension bridge will be the one now building between New York and Brooklyn. The length of the main span is 1,535 feet 6 inches; the entire length of the bridge, 5,930 feet.

The loftiest active volcano is Popocatepetl—"smoking mountain"—thirty-five miles southwest of Puebla, Mexico. It is 17,784 feet above the sea level, and has a crater three miles in circumference and 1,000 feet deep.

The largest island in the world, which is also regarded as a continent, is Australia. It is 2,500 miles in length from east to west, and measures 1,950 miles from north to south. Its area is 2,981,487 square miles.

The longest span of wire in the world is used for a telegraph line, over the river Kistnah, between Bezoar and Sontaganund. It is more than 6,000 feet long, and is stretched between two hills, each of which is 1,200 feet high.

The largest ship in the world is the Great Eastern, in the city of the same name, fifty-five miles from London. It consists of twenty-one masts and five hulls. Oxford was a seat of learning as early as the time of Edward the Confessor. University colleges claim to have been founded by Alfred.

The largest body of fresh water on the globe is Lake Superior—400 miles long, 190 miles wide at its greatest breadth, and having an area of 32,000 square miles. Its mean depth is said to be 163 feet, and its greatest depth about 200 fathoms. Its surface is about 635 feet above the level of the sea.

The most extensive park is Deer Park, in the environs of Copenhagen, Denmark. The inclosure contains about 4,200 acres, and is divided by a small river. The largest pleasure ground in this country, and one of the largest in the world, is Fairmount Park, Philadelphia, which contains 2,740 acres.

The biggest cavern is the Mammoth cave, in Edmonstone county, Ky. It is near Green river, six miles from Cave City, and about twenty-eight miles from Bowling Green. The cave consists of a succession of irregular chambers, some of which are large, situated on different levels. Some of these are traversed by navigable branches of the subterranean Echo river. Blind fish are found in its waters.

The largest tunnel in the world is that of St. Gotthard, on the line of railroad between Lucerne and Milan. The summit of the tunnel is 900 feet below the surface of Andermat, and 6,000 feet beneath the peak of Kastellhorn, of the St. Gotthard group. The tunnel is 204 feet wide, and 19 feet 10 inches from the floor to the crown of the arched roof. It is 15 1/2 miles long—11 miles longer than the Mt. Cenis tunnel.

The biggest trees in the world are the mammoth trees of California. One of a grove in Tulare county, according to measurement made by inches of the State Geologist Survey, was shown to be 276 feet high, 106 feet in circumference at the base, and 76 feet at a point 12 feet above the ground. Some of the trees are 370 feet high and 34 feet in diameter. Some of the largest trees that have been felled indicate an age of from 2,000 to 2,500 years.
